Dallas police said Thursday night they anticipate that "thousands of well-comers" will jam Love Field to greet President Kennedy when his jet airliner lands there Friday morning.

Police Capt. Glen King said officers anticipate parking lots at the airport will be filled long before the scheduled arrival of the President at 11:35 a.m.

Capt. King said police will divert additional cars into an auxiliary lot which motorists may reach by turning right off Cedar Springs Road after passing the Ramada Inn.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Weather Bureau forecast cloudy skies and occasional showers.

Split State Party Continues Feuds

HOUSTON, Texas—President Kennedy wound up a day of "nonpolitical" campaigning in the Lone Star State Thursday night with almost a hurricane of political controversy swirling about him.

The divided Texas Democratic party continued its feuds as the President visited San Antonio and Houston in balmy springlike weather with large and mostly curious crowds turning out to see him and the First Lady.

The day got off to a bad start, politically, even before the presidential jet 707 reached San Antonio in early afternoon.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, in the same plane as the President, let go with a blast at Gov. John B. Connally as the big plane headed toward Texas.

Yarborough, in effect, issued a statement in which he was sharply critical of Connally for failing to invite him to a reception at the Governor's Mansion Friday evening.

Yarborough Statement Criticizes Connally

"I've had many telephone calls and letters from friends because Mrs. Yarborough and I were not invited to the mansion," Yarborough said.

"I want everyone to join hands in harmony for the greatest wel-

then Yarborough added: Gov. Connally is so terribly uneducated governmentally, how you expect anything else?"

Subsequently, Connally and Yarborough both rode with the dent on the flight from San Antonio to Houston, but it was not whether any effort was made by the President to patch up Texas Democratic internecine battle.

Asked for comment on Yarborough's remarks, Connally issued following statement Thursday night:

"The purpose of all our efforts has been to warmly welcome to the President and vice-president and their ladies.

"I am glad they have been so received in a true Texan manner."

President Pays Tribute to Rep. Thomas

The President came here Thursday to pay tribute to Houston's ran congressman, Albert Thomas, who was instrumental in getting the Manned Spacecraft Center for his city.

At a testimonial dinner he hailed Thomas as a congressman who consistently loyal to his party—but stays above petty partisan or activities.

But the political situation overshadowed all of the President's activities.

The Yarborough feud with the dominant machinery of the state Democratic party carried over into the motorcades in both San Antonio and Houston, with Yarborough refusing to take his assigned seat in both cities in cars bearing Vice-President and Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson.

President John F. Kennedy was assassinated by a sniper's bullet in Dallas Friday.

He died at 1 p.m. in Parkland Hospital—31 minutes after an ambush bullet struck his head near Houston and Elm.

Gov. John Connally, riding at his side in the open convertible, was shot in the back. He was in surgery in mid-afternoon. His condition was satisfactory.

The President was waving to sidewalk throngs near the Triple Underpass when gunfire erupted—apparently from the Schoolbook Depository building at 411 Elm.

He clutched his chest and fell into his wife's arms.

Gov. Connally was shot in the back. He fell to the floor at his wife's feet. The two wives, sobbing, huddled over their husbands.

Lee Oswald, 24, a 30-day employe of the Texas School Book Depository, from whose building the assassin's bullet was believed fired, was arrested several minutes later, as a suspect in the fatal shooting of a policeman in Oak Cliff.

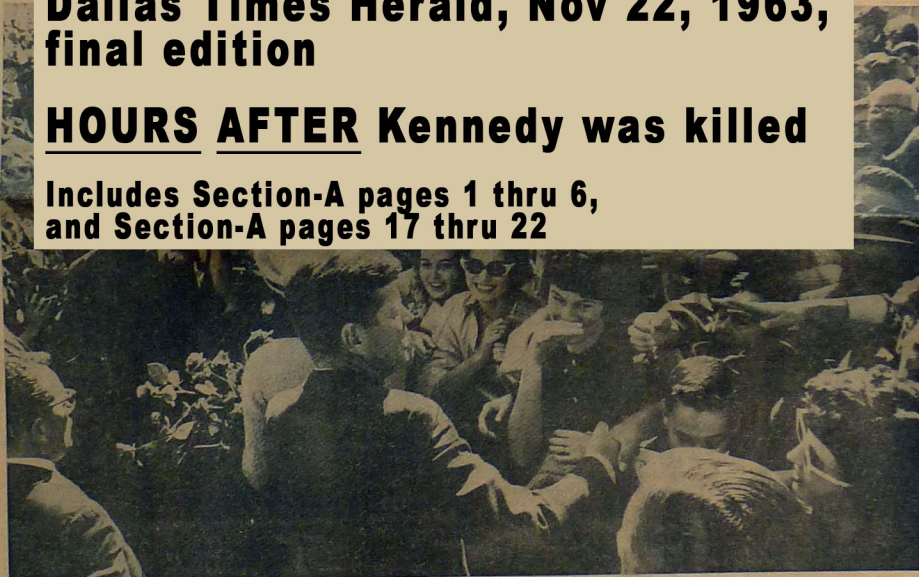
Oswald, a resident of Irving whose job at the depository firm was filling orders and wrapping, was seen in the building about noon.

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Ochus V. Campbell, vice president of the firm, said the sixth floor of the building, where the rifle was found, would have been easily accessible to Oswald.

"Shortly after the shooting, we raced back into the building and saw him in a small storage room on the ground floor," Mr. Campbell said. "Then, we noticed he was gone. He didn't have permission to leave and we haven't seen him since."

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson was sworn in as President of the United States by U.S. Dist. Judge Sarah T. Hughes aboard the presidential jet at Love Field.

Shortly before 3 p.m., Mr. Johnson raised his right hand and said: "I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Mr. Johnson was to leave immediately after for Washington.

Photographer Bob Jackson of The Times Herald heard one shot and then two more rapid shots. From his vantage point in an open convertible, the eighth car in the procession, Jackson saw two men peering from the building window on the fifth floor.

They were looking directly above their heads. Jackson saw a rifle being drawn back into a sixth floor window.

It disappeared quickly and he saw no more. The stock appeared to be dark brown, Jackson said.

Secret Service agents ordered the motorcade to proceed at high speed to Parkland Hospital.

President Kennedy, still cradled in his wife's arms, was rushed to emergency. Blood transfusions of B positive blood were administered.

Shortly before 1 p.m. two Catholic priests entered emergency. Several minutes later they emerged and announced the President was dead.

White House assistant press secretary Malcolm Kilduff said at 1:30 p.m.:

"President John F. Kennedy died at approximately 1 o'clock Central Standard Time. He died of a gunshot wound in the brain."

Mr. Kilduff said Gov. Connally was hit once in the left side and once in the wrist. Vice President Johnson escaped injury.

An Oneal Funeral Home hearse took the President's body from Parkland Hospital at 2:08 p.m. His body was to be flown to Washington.

Mrs. Kennedy left Parkland Hospital surrounded by police officers shortly after the body of her husband was placed in the hearse. She spoke briefly to an Air Force officer and then left in the hearse.

Gov. Connally's Austin office, in contact with Parkland Hospital by a "hot line," had reported the governor's condition at 1:41 p.m. as "serious." This was later changed to satisfactory.

Press secretary George Christian said the governor was hit in the right chest, front and back; had a fracture of the radius and a minor leg wound.

He said X-rays were just taken and the governor was prepared for surgery.

"All the vital signs are good—pulse normal,

blood pressure good, color good. He is in great pain but calm and has been conscious the whole time," Christian reported.

As FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover ordered Dallas FBI men into the extensive search for the assassin, investigators reported finding the rifle thought to have fired the fatal shots.

The gun, described as a high-powered World

War II surplus weapon with a telescopic sight, was uncovered in the northwest corner of the sixth floor of the book depository building.

The weapon with a shell still in it was found half hidden under stacks of school and religious books.

In front of an open window, Police Sgt. Jerry Hill said, three expended rifle shells were discovered. By the window were remnants of fried chicken.

A wall of book boxes had been erected and three boxes in front of the window were believed to have been used by the sniper to steady his aim.

There were unconfirmed reports that a Secret Service agent was also killed by gunfire.

A spokesman at the Secret Service headquarters at Dallas said could not confirm or deny the report.

"All I've heard," he told newsmen, "is the same reports you've heard."

Sheriff Bill Decker reported his investigators had picked up two eye-witnesses to the shooting who had seen a man with a rifle.

"I couldn't question them here on the street. They claim they can identify the person with the rifle if they see him," the sheriff said.

Squad cars and motorcycles with sirens wailing sped through the downtown Dallas area moments after the shooting as all available officers were

SULPHUR SPRINGS—Coon Creek Gandy says the political world both low hard in Dallas today, naturally. But here at his comfortable home on Houston Street, he vows and declares that he's thrown in the towel. The 80-year-old backwoods man who turned his nickname and a seventh grade education into 12 years as Texas legislator says, quote: "Government started going down when we quit votin' for 'em and started stayin' with 'em party—regardless," unquote.

Mr. Gandy, who at the age of 57 had his name legally changed from Joe Gandy to Coon Creek Gandy, still thinks that lucky day in the late Charles Berry's court.

WINNSBORO and there is really a Coon Creek that heads in Hopkins County.

At the age of 20 he was possessed of an urge to write a letter to the local newspaper, the Winsboro Wide Awake. The editor printed it, and the readers talked about it.

"I just wrote about what happened," he explained. "When a salve salesman came by I'd write how he claimed it would put near do everything but raise 'em dead. Or some widow whose petticoat showed in church, or maybe how somebody folded his socks under to keep a hole in the heel from showin'."

His favorite Texas governors were Allan Shivers and Cole Stevenson.

Today, Mr. Gandy still enjoys reading columns he wrote half a century ago. In MT. VERNON, L. D. Lowery publishes Farm Talk, which is circulated through this area. With Coon Creek's permission, the publication includes one of his old masterpieces of folk lore and philosophy. "But I gradually changed my style or writin'," he explained further. "I got to goin' easier on people—if it was the truth—after a fellow part near got to me with a shotgun. You know, I wonder if people realize how much influence just an ordinary shotgun has."

He is a big man, plus 200 pounds and six feet. Shell rim glasses and a hearing aid help toward normalcy but he says his legs, like true Democrats, have about "give out."

Mrs. Gandy an, astute dietitian, ground her own vegetables into juices for recovery from an illness, 10 days 15 years younger than her 77. Her name is Minnie. Her twin sister, at 1316 Northwest 92nd in Oklahoma City, is named Clinnie. They're spirit images of each other. Come next Tuesday, Coon Creek and Minnie will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary. Although they are both Methodist, a Baptist pastor read the rites while the couple sat in their borrowed buggy at Greenwood. His name is Rev. Birl Day, and he has never collected for the task. Said Mr. Gandy: "I was so excited I forgot to pay, and 'til 'em price then was a dollar."

"I'd been writin' a column for years for Southwest Magazine. It went into hundreds of weekly newspapers—and 'til 'em it was Coon Creek," he recalls.

So I figured I'd a heap better chance winnin' if I ran under that name," he continued. "Well, first thing, when they came out to see me and asked me to run for the Legislature, my brother Wylie said I'd lost their mind, and so had I. But somethin', I took 'em up. I sold a cow to finance my campaign and got some pants that didn't have patches. "After I'd just got started in my old car, I stopped one day on a country road and sat down on 'til 'em" heard and asked myself if I really had lost my mind. Even though I was almost sixty I had a big cry right there on that runnin' board.

"But I got over it and worked harder than ever. Just soon' people never made a speech. But when I found out that state law wouldn't let me use my nickname of Coon Creek, that's when I decided to make it real name in court."

So Coon Creek won handily in a runoff. He stayed a dozen years and two more as assistant sergeant at arms. "But the House wasn't made for a amutt dipper," he recalled. "I had 't give it up, and put near quit dipper for good. But when I got back, ol' Levi Garrett got me back."

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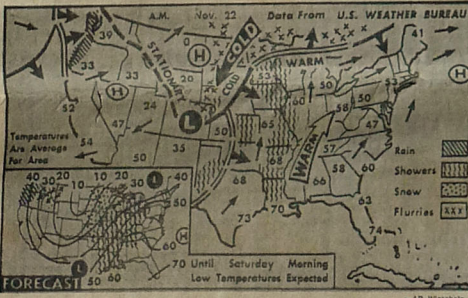

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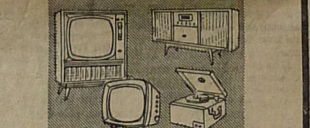

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Russians Warn U.S. Can't Make Rules

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union accused the United States today of trying to make the rules for Soviet policing of Western convoys on the Berlin autobahn. The Russians warned they would not permit this.

A Russian note to the U.S. government rejected an American protest over the stalling of a U.S. Army convoy for 42 hours Nov. 45 because the

from their vehicles and be counted.

The Kremlin note said: "The claims of the American authorities to establish at their discretion the range of duties and manner of action of Soviet representatives at the checkpoint in checking American servicemen are in general absolutely untenable."

Since Oct. 10 the Russians have held up three American convoys and one British convoy at Soviet checkpoints on the autobahn because the convoy commanders refused to allow their men to be counted.

The Western Allies said their policy is to permit their troops to disembark for a Soviet head count only if more than 30 men were aboard, not counting drivers and co-drivers. The Allies also refused to lower their truck tailgates to permit a head count.

The Western powers spelled out this procedure to the Soviet Union on Oct. 29.

During the six-week period since Oct. 10, a number of other Allied convoys with fewer than 30 passengers have made the autobahn trip without interference.

The Russian note charged that the Americans artificially provoked the delay Nov. 45 and that it was a result of "unfortunate actions" by U.S. officers in charge of the convoy. It said "some irresponsible American officers could spark off dangerous incidents."

U.S. RESPONSIBILITY

It warned that "the entire responsibility for possible undesirable consequences of the violation by American servicemen of control procedure at Soviet checkpoints will rest entirely with the American side."

The Soviet note claimed that British and French officers "acted in conformity with existing procedure, presented their personnel for verification and took measures for unhampered and fast checking."

The Russians also claimed further that the Americans finally "expressed their consent to undergo the same checking" as the British and French.

Senior Senators Shrug Off Attack

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Joseph S. Clark's new charge that the "Senate establishment" is staging a sit-down strike against major Kennedy legislation left the targets of his attack unfrustrated today.

Senate GOP Leader Everett Dirksen, Ill., said he thought the Pennsylvania Democrat's attack on key committee chairmen and other senators was "sheer futility at this season."

Dirksen said Clark's moves to force the tax cut, civil rights and State Department appropriations bills from Senate committees "haven't got the chance to be a snowball in you-know-where."

Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., whose appropriations subcommittee has just completed hearings on the State Department money bill that his group received June 19, told a reporter:

"If Sen. Clark can get it done his way quicker and better he's welcome to do it."

Clark filed resolutions Thursday to discharge the Finance Committee, headed by Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., from further consideration of the tax cut bill and to force the State-Justice-Commerce appropriations bill from committee. Sen. Carl Hayden, D-Ariz., is chairman of the Appropriations Committee.

He said he would introduce a similar resolution to force the civil rights bill from the Judiciary Committee, headed by Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., if administration backers could not get action.

The Pennsylvania liberal told the Senate that Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., was not responsible for so many key bills still being in committee. Clark said the Impasse should be blamed on a "Senate establishment" of senior, conservative senators.

COLD FRONT

4.47-Inch Rain Hits E. Texas

Rains that ranged up to 4.47 inches fell before dawn Friday in dry East Texas as the coldest weather of the season headed for the Panhandle.

The Weather Bureau predicted a hard freeze in the Panhandle with lows down to 22 degrees.

Rain fell most of the night in the Jasper area and still was falling when the 4.47 measurement was taken.

The Beaumont and Port Arthur areas got 1.78 and Texarkana 1.67. The Sam Rayburn Dam north of Jasper measured 1.33.

Other hard rains included Kountze 1.25 inches, San Angustine 1.75, DeKalb 1.46, Carthage 1.78, Winnaboro 1.13, Gloster 1.95 and Clarksville 1.25.

Overnight rainfall totals included Marfa 1.6 inch, Beaumont 1.78, Texarkana 1.67, Lorraine 75, Rottan 49, Crandall 33, Childress 27, Wink 11, Longview 32, and Lufkin 14.

Showers and occasionally sharp thunderstorms paced a Pacific cool front across Texas from west to east during the night and arctic air surged southward into the Panhandle Friday.

The mercury slipped below freezing at Dalhart after a dry norther arrived, dropping to 31 before dawn. Temperatures were as much as 45 degrees warmer in the lower Texas coast at the same hour.

Although hard rains fell briefly at some points to mark passage of the Pacific front, a severe thunderstorm alert for most of the Panhandle and parts of the South Plains expired Thursday night with no report of damage.

By early morning the front edge of the milder front lay along a line from just east of Dallas toward the northeast and southwest.

The Weather Bureau predicted at least partly cloudy skies and cooler weather throughout the state by Friday night, with scattered showers continuing across the eastern half of Texas in the evening.

French-German Unity Stressed By West German

PARIS (AP) — West German Chancellor Ludwig Erhard said today he considers French-German cooperation and European unity as the first steps toward a larger Atlantic union covering political, military, economic and social affairs.

At the end of two days of talks with President Charles de Gaulle and other French leaders, Erhard said French-German cooperation was a driving force in the policies of his government.

"I consider continuance of this work without respite as one of my primary tasks in foreign policy," Erhard said in an address prepared for delivery before the French diplomatic press association.

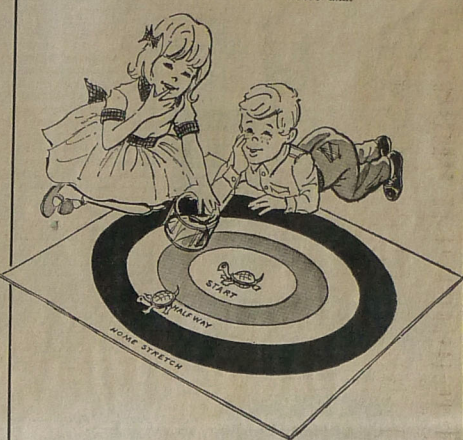
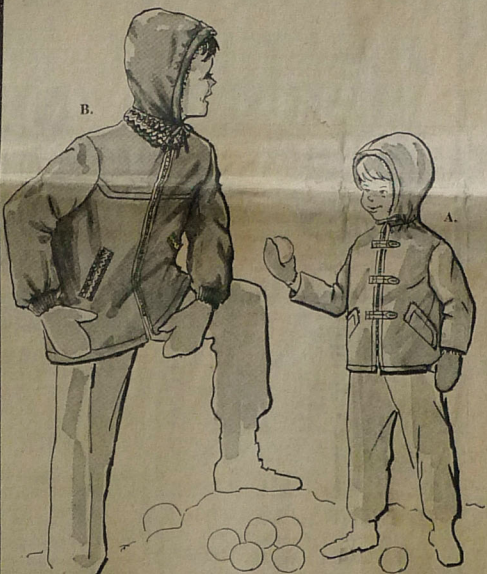
He noted that there had been delays in forging European political unity because of differences about the approach. But he said he believed common political institutions should be set up if Europe is to claim her rightful place in the world.

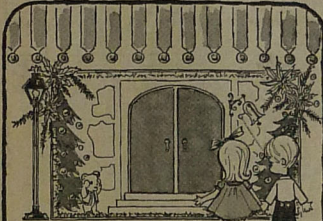

Viet Nam Shows Hope, U.S. Feels

New Regime Must Win Peasant Support, Officials Agree at Meet

By FRED S. HOFFMAN WASHINGTON (AP)—Top U.S. officials who assessed the post-coup situation in South Viet Nam reportedly concluded that the new military regime still must prove it can win support of the Vietnamese peasants.

Administration officials who met in Honolulu two days ago with American diplomatic and military leaders from South Viet Nam agreed cautiously that things are going reasonably well so far.

Sources familiar with what went on at the Hawaii conference indicated the report to President Kennedy is not likely

to call for any sharp policy changes. **LODGE, JFK MEET** Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, who was among those taking part in the Honolulu talks will meet Sunday with Kennedy at Kennedy's country place in Virginia. The ambassador's report may have a bearing on any decision regarding the timing of possible recognition of the Saigon military regime.

The views that Kennedy eventually gets from all of the top participants in the Hawaii meeting are expected to sum up this consensus. The signs are promising but it may take six months to tell whether the overthrow of the Diem regime has brought victory in the anti-Communist war closer.

U.S. officials do not expect a democratic regime patterned after the American image to emerge in South Viet Nam. This, they believe, is not realistic. What they are hoping for is a government that forswears brutality and repression—and thus far the military junta seems to be tending in that direction.

NO FORCED LABOR It was considered hopeful, for example, that the new military leaders have stopped using forced labor in building the strategic hamlets that are being counted on to shield the peasants from guerrilla terrorism. Ultimately this could cost the United States more if it has to foot the bill to pay for labor that replaces freed workers. However, such a decision has not yet been reached, sources said.

The Honolulu meeting was told that the peasants who make up the large bulk of South Viet Nam's 14 million population still are apathetic, although there was a big upsurge of enthusiasm for the military revolutionists in the cities where anti-Diem sentiment was strong.

It long has been a cornerstone of U.S. policy that the war-weary peasants, dissatisfied with the Diem regime, cannot be won without the backing of the peasants, he noted. Government of President Ngo Dinh Diem did not have that support, American officials believe.

Although a good start has been made by the new regime, sources said, much remains to be done in the field of winning over the people.

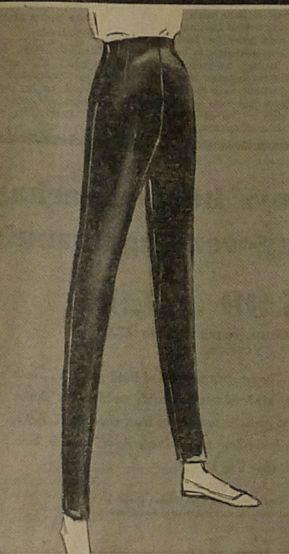

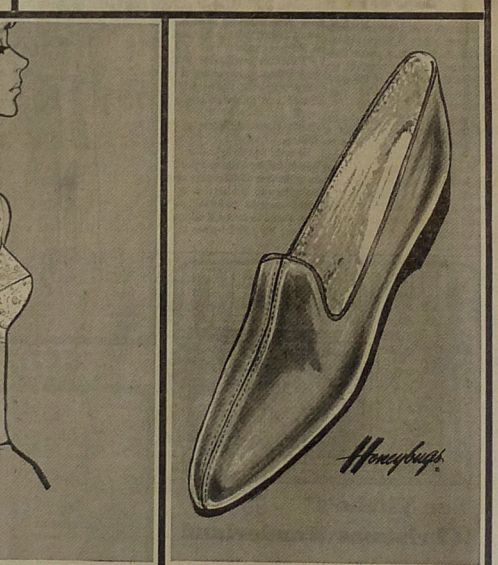

CHICAGO (AP)—Cold weather, with snow, sleet and freezing rain, spread across wide areas in the Upper Plains region today, but unseasonably mild temperatures continued in the major part of the nation.

The core of the cold air from Canada centered in Western North Dakota and Eastern Montana, with temperatures near zero. Light snow fell in most of the Dakotas, Montana, Western and Central Nebraska, parts of Wyoming and Eastern Colorado.

Hazardous driving conditions were reported in the wet belt, and livestock warnings were issued by the Weather Bureau. Sleet and freezing rain mixed with snow also created dangerous driving conditions in areas east of the cold belt.

Showers and thunderstorms broke out in the moist warm air which spread from the Gulf into the nation's midsection. The mild air also covered most areas in the eastern half of the nation with temperatures far above seasonal levels.

Other wet spots included a belt of rain that spread inland across the Pacific Northwest and showers in the Southern Rockies. Fairly mild and dry weather prevailed along the East Coast and in most areas west of the Continental Divide.

Widow Appears In Baker Inquiry

WASHINGTON (AP)—The testimony of a Washington widow has opened new avenues of Senate investigation into the tangled business affairs of Robert G. Baker.

Chairman B. Everett Jordan of the Senate Rules Committee gave this word to newsmen Thursday after Gertrude C. Novak had been questioned in secret for 2 1/2 hours.

The North Carolina Democrat said Mrs. Novak had supplied some documents on dealings with Baker by her late husband, Alfred. Jordan said the committee did not get into the matter of Novak's death—it occurred in March 1962 and was ruled a suicide—but will do so later.

Baker, 35, resigned as secretary to the Senate's Democratic majority Oct. 7 amid allegations that he used his position to further his private business interests. Among them was a luxury hotel at Ocean City, Md., which he operated with Novak and Novak's brother Donald.

Jordan said that as far as he knows, the committee, its counsel and its investigators have not been in touch with Baker since the inquiry began. It was authorized two days after Baker resigned.

He said that Baker will be called when the committee is ready.

To newsmen's questions, Mrs. Novak said there was no connection between the Baker case and her husband's death. Of her examination by the committee she would say only that it was "very thorough."

Mrs. Novak has been an employee of the Senate Small Business Committee for 13 years. After her husband's death she became Baker's partner in the motel operation.

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Two leading Wisconsin Republicans say they think Rep. John W. Byrnes will skip a bid to become a favorite son candidate for the presidential nomination in the state's 1964 primary because of his dealings with a company whose stock recorded fabulous profits.

BACK TO MOSCOW

Some Is Good, Some Bad

By JOHN LLOYD
 LONDON (AP)—If you wanted to buy a chocolate bar and you found it cost \$1 you would grumble.
 If you found that a very small screwy, unattractive chicken cost \$3 you wouldn't like it at all.
 Especially if you earned \$10 a month.
 But apartment rent might be \$5 or \$6 a month. You wouldn't grumble about that. Nor would you object to a bent fare on the subway or bus to anywhere you wanted to go.
 You would not like paying two weeks' salary for a new dress or perhaps double that for a new suit. But if you were enthusiastic about everybody being alike and about everybody being lifted, en masse, to a better plane of existence, and were not fussy about the time it took you to get along with the idea.
 Twenty-seven years ago I was a correspondent in Moscow. Subsequent events took me to various other parts of the world.

Only now have I had the opportunity to go back.
 A city that in my time claimed two million people has six million today. Very wide avenues, straight as a die, cut through it, and five bridges span the broad river where there were next to none before Apartment houses, all exactly the same but nevertheless large, cover a vast area on the outskirts that formerly was a dump.
 Moscow has spread as it has grown in population. A furious building enterprise is going on. People still wait for the chance to get proper living quarters. Proper means small rooms and not many, but there is good heat, there is plumbing and for many people it is more than they have had in the past.
 Moscow is drab, and the people, from one point of view, dress drably. There is no elegance, no froth. But they appear to be comfortably clad, and they appear, en masse, to be not unhappy with the circum-

stances.
 You can compare Russia only to its past. You cannot compare it to the Western world. Our ways of life are totally different, and that is not wholly a matter of the revolution.
 Twenty-seven years ago an air of fear cloaked Moscow and other parts of the Soviet Union that now has been much relieved. It still is not easy to mix freely, but let us remember characteristics of a people as well as those of a state. Suspicion, mystery, intrigue always were there. Russians drink heavily and sometimes are gay, but Russians in town are a grim rather than a frivolous people.
 There is the same old mustiness in Moscow that was there 27 years ago. It is an indoor phenomenon, but it gets into your clothes and you feel you are carrying it about with you. It comes from a combination of smokes, lack of fresh air and crowded living. It is not a political thing.
 Westerners who visit Moscow

are put up in the same hotels used 27 years ago. If any change of paint, polish on carpeting has taken place in that time, the artisans were expert at keeping alive old traditions.
 Traffic is extremely light compared to that in Western cities. Parking is no problem. Almost all cars are black and the current model is equivalent to Western cars of eight or 10 years' vintage. There are abundant traffic lights and police supervision is good.
 There are two channels of television. One may be showing a play, an opera or ballet, the other a circus or sports, and there is plenty of politics. By politics I mean that of the state. There are no sweet lovelies and there is no frivolity.
 Twenty-seven years ago one would hesitate even to approach the gates of the Kremlin. Now people go in and out without even a check. Tours, with guides, go in to see the elaborate churches and the magnificent museum.

Next Mexico Race May Be Boycotted

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A plan for Mexico's second strongest but small political party to abstain from putting up a presidential candidate in next summer's election is gaining strength.
 The National Action party (Pan) headquarters said the Hidalgo State convention had endorsed the plan, put forth as a way to protest what its backers call the one-party dictatorship by the government's Institutional Revolutionary party (PRI).
 The government party has dominated elections for a quarter of a century.
 Should National Action decide not to put up a candidate, it probably would leave the government party's nominee, former Interior Minister Gustavo Diaz Ordaz, unopposed.
 Other opposition parties are expected to follow custom and endorse the government party's candidate.
 The party's president, Adolfo Christlieb Balleza, is working against the abstention move.
 A decision will come in the party's national convention this weekend.

Drug-Tipped Darts Urged To Knock Out Criminals

DOUGLASVILLE, Ga. (AP)—A globe-trotting Georgian, Harold C. Palmer, has put elephants, rhinoceroses and whales to sleep with dart guns and he thinks such guns will be put into the hands of policemen as the next major step in the war against crime.
 Police use of dart guns would be humane, safe for bystanders, costless for criminals and would help to deglamorize crime, Palmer said in an interview.
 The New York City police department is studying use of the dart gun. "It is a possible humane weapon of the future," said a department spokesman.
 Palmer, with four other Georgians, developed gas-fired rifles and pistols and special darts in the late 1950s to use in animal work.
 On a 125-acre wooded area near here, he and his associates assemble the darts, a type of hypodermic needle and experiment with various drugs.
 Palmer spends several months each year in foreign countries working on studies in wildlife

immigration, relocation and disease.
 Palmer, president of the Palmer Chemical and Equipment Co., demonstrated how the immobilizing procedure works by firing a dart containing 125 milligrams of a sleep-inducing drug into a goat.
 The animal never flinched as the needle entered his side from a pistol 10 feet away. After three minutes the goat's legs started bending and within another minute he was on the ground.
 This type of drug, Palmer said, could be used against berserk persons or to subdue an unruly prisoner.
 At Athens, Ga., Sheriff H. T. Huff said that he shot a drug into a prisoner March 8, 1962, after he destroyed the interior of the cell during a four-hour rampage.
 The only manner of preventing bodily injury to law enforcers of dart guns — against airplane pilots, personnel and inmates — would have been to shoot him with a firearm," Huff said.
 "As a last resort, I decided to attempt immobilization with-

a county physician."
 He said the 240-pound prisoner was hit in the right abdominal wall and within 5 1/2 minutes he was shackled without resistance. "There is no question of the humane aspect involved," Huff said.

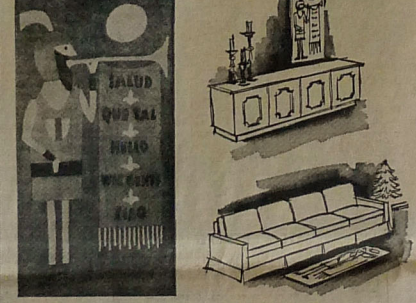

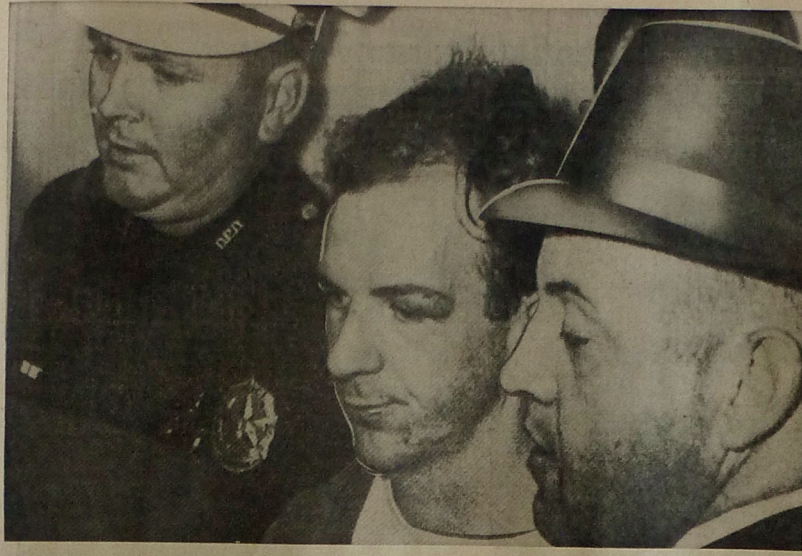

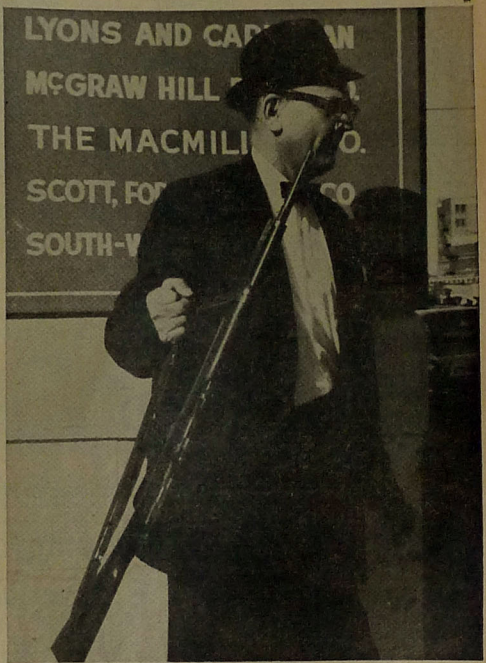

Wave of Unbelief Sweeps Over Trade Mart Crowd

Unbeliever swept the huge crowd at the Trade Mart Friday when J. Enik Jonsson, master of ceremonies, announced that President Kennedy had been shot.

The 2,400 diners were there to hear the President speak. When the announcement was made that, in the words of Mr. Jonsson, "There has been a mishap . . .," silence descended over the immense hall.

"Most of the guests were eating by the time the announcement was made. Mr. Jonsson made a brief announcement first merely that something had happened to the President. Then, as the guests stirred uneasily, not knowing what to think, he returned to the podium. "Ladies and gentlemen," he said, his voice firm but emotion-packed, "I'm not sure that I can say what I have to say . . . It is true . . . Our President and Governor Connally have been shot. We don't know how seriously. Reports are scanty."

SOBS, A SCREAM

Then the crowd began to stir. Sobs were heard and now and then a high, news-crowd echoed in the air. But the people mostly remained in their seats, whispering to each other in disbelief. They still did not know how

seriously the President was injured. But a few transistor radios in the crowd, and the KRLD-TV mobile news unit parked behind the building, became command posts for news.

And it was only a few, hushed minutes until the hall knew that this was the unbelievably worst news it could have heard.

Immediately after Mr. Jonsson's announcement, the Rev. Luther Holcomb went to the microphone and called for prayer.

"Oh, God," he prayed, "Name us all we can find words to express the deepest feelings of our hearts. We realize it is a time of mourning, but we are relying upon the faith that we possess to see us through this most difficult period."

"Each of us comes with perhaps the most earnest prayer we have ever offered, for our President and our governor and their families."

BEGIN TO LEAVE

After the oppressive first wave of silent shock, people began leaving the hall. Not another bite was taken. Rows of steaks lay untouched, gray yellow roses lined the tables and the Six Flags of Texas, centerpieces moved in a delicate, air-conditioned breeze.

The reaction of Dr. Dean Harrison, pastor of the Rosemont Christian Church, was typical. "I don't know what to think," he said. "To think that this happened in Dallas."

Near him, Dallas City Manager Elgin Crull, wringing his hands, said again and again, "Nothing can be done now . . . nothing."

Robert Callan, Dallas Chamber of Commerce president, could

hardly talk. "It's . . . horrible . . .," he said.

WATER IN TEARS

A waiter standing near turned, tears on his face, and said, "It's pathetic."

A group of city leaders gathered below the speaker's platform and looked at each other in disbelief. C. A. Tatum could only shake his head. Times Herald Publisher John Runyan expressed total disbelief, even while acknowledging the report was true. Willis Tate, president of SMU said, "I am so ashamed I am sick . . . nauseated."

Karl Holtzelle said, "This is the most outrageous thing that ever happened . . ."

City Councilman Joe Golman spoke for most of the individuals in the crowd when he said, "I am still in a deep state of shock . . . Just such as this has happened to the President of the United States . . . words leave me."

AMONG MOURNERS

Among those mourning the President's death at the stunned scene was Charles Minnick, assigned to the Secret Service detail for the trip here. Ordinarily he is a master specialist in the Army assigned to the White House. It was his duty to set up the flags and sentinels at the President's place at the head table.

Standing near the empty executive chair he spoke quietly. "He would talk to anyone. He wanted to be friends with everyone."

The table setting of silverware, china and crystal, sitting mutely at the head table where the late President and Mrs. Kennedy were to be, will be kept intact for historical purposes, an executive of the Trade Mart said.

JFK, Patrolman Killing Linked

A police officer was fatally wounded in an incident in Oak Cliff which high-ranking officers said might be connected with the shooting of President Kennedy.

The police radio reported the officer, identified as J. D. Tippitt, was slain by a white man, about 40, about 5-foot 8, and slender with dark hair. Details of the shooting, in the 400 block of W. 10th were not immediately available.

A suspect was caught about an hour later at 2:10 p.m. at the Texas Theater on West Jefferson.

"There may be a tie-in," investigators said. "On a thing like this we have to check everything. We have a report the fellow who did the shooting of the policeman had a rifle in a car with him."

His description fits what we've heard from some witnesses," officers declared.

Officers said a white jacket, believed to have been worn by the policeman's assailant, was recovered near the scene of the shooting.

The suspect in shooting of the officer was about 25 years old with his blond hair cut short. He was slightly built with a ruddy complexion.

Wearing dark pants and a brownish sportshirt, the youth put up a fight when police went into the theater to arrest him.

Officers grabbed him and hustled him out of the theater, put him in a squad car and rushed him downtown, said Mrs. Julie Postal, cashier at the theater.

A plainclothes Dallas detective said the man clicked a revolver twice when cornered at the Texas Theater on Jefferson St. He was subdued by a dozen uniformed and

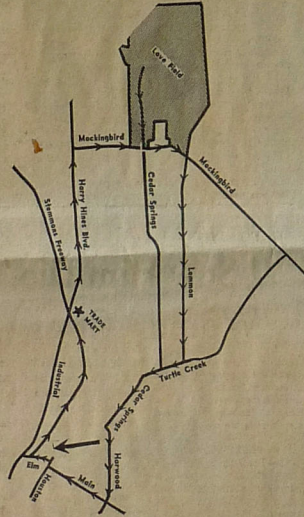
Florida Reports Polio Outbreak

Stunned Nation's Business Halted

The nation reeled in stunned disbelief Friday at the news that President Kennedy had been shot and killed by an assassin. Business came to a near standstill from coast to coast.

"Is it true?" A New York judge asked.

"How did it happen?" was another question.

But the big question in those first numbing moments of the momentous news from Dallas, was: "Is he alive?"

More than an hour passed before the feared answer came: The President is dead.

Anger followed the initial shock. In downtown Manhattan's Criminal Courts building a man slammed a newspaper violently into a desk and ran from a room in near hysteria.

The stock market closed early. Three governors attended the Midwest government conference in Omaha, Neb., stood wordlessly

around a television set. The Senate recessed in Washington, pending developments.

Said Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., just before the recess: "If there was ever an hour when all Americans should pray, this is the hour."

In Hyannis Port, Mass., where the President planned to spend Thanksgiving, a workman told the President's mother and father about the shooting. It was reported that neither commented.

Kennedy's father, a semi-invalid as the result of a stroke, was napping when the news came.

The President's mother reportedly was planning to leave immediately for Dallas.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts, the president's brother, was presiding over the Senate when the word came to Washington. An aide informed him and he rushed from the Senate chamber.

Dallas Policeman Recounts Instant Assassin Struck

(Editor's Note: Following is the account of Motorcycle Officer B. W. Hargis, whose uniform was splattered with blood when the President was shot. Officer Hargis was riding alongside the presidential car.)

On Houston Street the crowds were thinning out and as we got to Elm Street we turned left and I was just to the left fender almost right beside the President and his wife. Mrs. Kennedy was on the side that I was riding on. I was a couple of arm lengths away from her and about two feet from the car.

"About halfway down between Houston and the underpass, I heard the first shot. It sounded like a real loud firecracker. When I heard the sound, the first thing I thought about was a gunshot. I looked around and about then Gov. Connally turned around and looked at the President as a real surprised look on his face.

"The President evidently thought he wanted to say something to him. Connally was in a seat right directly in front of the President. The President bent over to hear what the governor had to say.

"When he raised back up was when the President got shot. About that time, I felt blood on my face and the presidential car stopped almost immediately after that and stayed stopped about half a second, then took off at a high rate of speed.

"I racked (parked) my motorcycle and jumped off I ran to the north side of Elm Street looking to see if I could find where the bullets were coming from. I saw CONNALLY HIT FIRST."

"I don't think the President got hit with the first shot, but that I know for sure. When I heard the first shot, it looked like he bent over. I feel that the governor was shot first. After the first shot, I was right. Right after the first shot, I was trying to look and see if the President got shot. When I saw the look on Connally's face, I knew somebody was shooting at the President in the right side of the head.

"I noticed the people in the Texas School Book Depository building were looking up to see to the top. I didn't know whether the President had stopped under the triple underpass or not. I didn't know for sure if the shots had come from the book depository. I thought they might have come from the trestle.

"I couldn't locate anyone that looked suspicious so I waited a few seconds, then ran back to my motorcycle and went to the triple underpass to see if the President had gotten away alright. I searched the other side of the trestle to see if I could see anyone, but I didn't observe anything.

"BIG SURROUNDING" I went back and we surrounded the building until search teams went inside from headquarters. They found the rifle and took it to have fingerprinted. An immediate investigation was begun on the gun's origin. It looked to me like a Mauser, one that they sell surplus for deer rifles, but that's just my own surmise.

"Then we searched out the witnesses. We found several including a Times Herald photographer, Bob Jackson, who saw the rifle. That's the way we know where the rifle was. As much as I can remember, I think she laid him in her lap. I didn't hear what she said."

Officer Hargis, who lives at 1818 Adeline, has been on the Dallas police force almost 10 years. He is a motorcycle officer in the Traffic Division. He is 31.

pressed into service. More than 100 patrolmen and detectives arrived to search the book building and surrounding structures.

Firemen joined the search of the building, using hook-and-ladder fire trucks to upper floors to aid in the search with high-powered spotlights.

At 2:30 p.m. the search of the building was completed.

Witnesses standing on a balcony at the courthouse gave this account of what they saw:

The motorcade had just turned into Houston Street from Main Street when a shot rang out. Pigeons flew up from the street. Then, two more shots rang out and Mr. Kennedy fell to the floor of the car.

Deputy Police Chief Ray Landry, leading the procession through Dallas, said he thought the shots were fired as the President's car neared the Triple Underpass.

Police issued a pickup order for an unknown white male, about 30, slender, 5-10, 165 pounds, armed with a .30 caliber rifle.

Police swarmed the book depository as the stunned crowd of persons watching the downtown parade watched.

The President was rushed to Parkland Hospital.

Sgt. G. D. Hensley, police dispatcher, directed all available police units to the downtown area near the western edge of downtown Dallas.

The Presidential convoy cut off its route and sped at high speed immediately toward Parkland Hospital where doctors were ordered to stand by.

The motorcade, originally set to turn off Industrial by the Trade Mart, sped straight down Industrial toward Harry Hines.

The police radio blared that the President had been hit.

Sheriff Decker came on the air around 12:25 p.m.

"I don't know what's happened. Take every available man from the jail and the office and go to the railroad yards off Elm near the triple underpass.

The crowds waiting inside the Trade Mart were not immediately told of the shooting.

A sobbing carpenter salesman told police minutes after the shooting the President appeared to be hit twice.

"The first time he slumped and the second one really blasted him," 38, of 1619 Kings Highway.

"After the first shot the President's wife rose slightly to hold the President and they both went down in the second shot. He was definitely hit badly," Mr. Drehm said.

Mr. Drehm said the President was half standing, waving to the crowd, when he heard the first of two shots. He said after the President was knocked down, apparently by the second shot, the President's car roared underneath the triple underpass.

The President, his limp body cradled in the arms of his wife, was rushed to Parkland Hospital. The Governor also was taken to Parkland.

towers above the underpass at Houston and Main Streets, a large number of the crowd could not say for sure where the shots came from or how many shots were fired.

"I definitely heard three shots," said Bo Mabrey.

Police immediately began rounding up large numbers of bystanders who may have seen something related to the infamous shooting.

The witness Drehm was shaking uncontrollably as he further described the shooting.

"The first shot must have been too solid, because he just slumped. Then on the second shot he seemed to fall back."

Drehm seemed to think the shots came from in front of or beside the President. He explained the President did not slump forward as if he would have after being shot from the rear. The book depository building stands in the rear of the President's location at the time of the shooting.

Apparently the President's car was on the down slope midway between Houston Street and the triple underpass.

Drehm said he was within 10 feet of the President at the time of the shooting.

"It was definitely a rifle," he said.

Mrs. Jean Hill, 9402 Buff Creek, and Mrs. Mary Moorman, 2838 Eppelwood, who were among witnesses at the Triple Underpass, said the motorcade stopped suddenly and then swiftly sped on with the sirens blaring.

"I thought I saw someone in the motorcade in street dress shoot back at a person running up the hill.

"The motorcade kept on going at the usual rate of speed for a second and then sped up.

"Some of the motorcycle policemen sped up and some stopped. I didn't see anyone get in the car with the President.

"I didn't see anyone else in the car. I kept looking at the President. I couldn't see any blood."

Mrs. Moorman, who snapped a picture just at the time the President was shot, said:

"I took the picture exactly at the moment the shot rang out. My Polaroid shows Kennedy slumped over in the car and it shows Jackie leaning towards him.

"I heard Mrs. Kennedy say, 'My God, he's been shot.'"

"I heard another shot or two ring out and I turned to my friend and we got on the ground."

"A man and his wife and a child were out in the middle of the green triangle and this man pushed his child to the ground."

Patrolman W. E. Barker saw workers in the Texas School Book Depository pecking on a window from the third floor and pointing to a man wearing horn-rimmed glasses, a plaid coat and rain coat.

The officer immediately arrested the man for questioning and placed him in a roomful of witnesses in Sheriff Bill Decker's office across the street from the depository.

NO ONE BELIEVED IT The Crowd Waited; 'They've Been Shot!'

(Editor's Note: A. C. Greene, editor of The Times Herald editorial page, was a member of the dinner audience awaiting President Kennedy's arrival.)

We were sitting, eating, waiting the usual chatter going on about whether the steaks were too done—when a woman came to the table behind us.

"They've been shot," she said, "all of them . . . Who?" "Nobody understood.

"All of them. President Kennedy . . . Governor Connally . . . Lyndon Johnson . . ."

A few people stopped eating, but no one could fully grasp what she said.

"They've been shot," she said again, almost sobbing. The murmur spread across the table, jumping from ours to the next one.

No one believed it. The guests seated by me turned to me because I was a newspaper man.

"It doesn't sound possible," I said. Everyone agreed that it sounded too much like a rumor. One by one we went back to our steaks and apple pie.

Then it came.

Far below we could see two men walk to the empty rostrum, the podium carrying the seal of the President of the United States.

One of the men took the microphone and cleared his throat, the vast Trade Mart stilled as if one giant hand had closed all our mouths.

"Ladies and gentlemen . . ." The speaker began. Someone shut off the water fountains which splashed in the wide courtyard of the mart. The silence grew utterly complete except for the twitter and cheep of a bird, one of the parakeets which fly free in the hall.

"There has been a mishap," the man at the microphone said. "The President has been shot . . . his condition . . . is critical but he is not . . ."

I never heard the rest. It was not pandemonium, it was the silent, blanketing silence of disbelief. It muffled our ears, our minds and our hearts.

"Oh my God . . ." a woman beside me moaned. "It can't be true. It can't be true . . . the murmur ran up and down our table.

The silence held over the huge crowd like a prayer, as well it might have been. There were prayers going up at that moment and from every heart there came the hope that what had been said was not true.

But we knew. We looked around us, at each other, at the strangers, the friends, the well known, the unknown people of Dallas who were there, waiting for the President. And we saw on each others faces that it was true.

"Let's go," I said to my companion. "Let's get out of here."

We pushed our way through the people who were on their feet, but most of them were still sitting at their tables. No one was talking. Some women were crying, I saw a husband holding his wife's hand. We made the exit and behind me, as I fled into the outside, the confused, terrible swell of horror was filling the hall.

By the time we arrived at the newspaper office, the President was dead.

'I Saw Him Die,' Woman Cries

(Editor's Note: Mrs. Barney head of the shipping department at Jeanifer Juniors, was in the crowd at the corner of Main and Houston. She saw the President die. Here is her report.)

Today I saw the President die. I was standing at the curb on Main about a third of the way from Houston Street near the overpass.

When the President's car made the curve around the corner, he was smiling and waving.

He was not standing, as I heard some reports say later. He was sitting, but he was happy and Jackie was happy and smiling as they passed.

The car had passed about 15 feet beyond me when I heard the first shot. I did not realize it was a shot; I thought it was a backfire. The President ducked; instinctively I told myself "something is happening," but nobody knew what.

Then I heard a second shot. I noticed that Jackie didn't duck.

I could no longer see the President. The car momentarily stopped, then veered slightly to the right and speeded off.

People around me were screaming; some were falling to the ground. I could not tell whether they were hit, or not—or just dodging. There was pandemonium.

Everybody realized that the shots were coming from up high. People were running around cars and jumping over things.

Soon, all the buildings around here were locked—including ours. Squad cars converged. There must have been a hundred of them right away.

My employer, Mr. (Ab) Zaprudel was making movies at the time it happened. He is still with the Secret Service men.

As soon as we were inside the building before any reports on the condition of the President Mr. Zaprudel had already told us — "The President of the United States is dead."

We all saw him die.

WITNESS ACCOUNT

Lensman Heard Shots, Saw Gun

(Editor's Note: This is an eyewitness account of the assassination of the President by a Dallas Times Herald photographer riding in a car close behind the presidential car Friday.)

There were five of us in the car. When I heard the first shot, the President had already turned the corner. We heard the shot and I was the only one who saw the car.

There were two more shots.

As far as I know, three shots were all I heard. I just instinctively looked that way. First, somebody joked about it being a firecracker.

Then, since I was facing the building where the shot was coming from, I just glanced up and saw two colored men in a window straining to look at a window above them.

U.S. Accepts Trade Panel Poultry Rule

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A basis for settlement of the U.S.-Common Market "chicken war" has been reached with American acceptance yesterday of the trading by a panel of trade experts.

The panel, established by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT), estimated that the United States lost \$26 million a year in its exports to the Common Market because of the market countries' prohibitive duty on poultry imports.

Christian A. Herter, the President's special representative for trade negotiations, said in a statement that the United States will now proceed with plans to increase American exports on selected items equivalent to \$20 million worth of Common Market imports into this country.

Noting that the tariff experts estimate of the losses to the United States were \$20 million below U.S. estimates, Herter said:

"It is a judgment rendered by a panel of distinguished individuals who are thoroughly familiar with GATT practices and procedures and it will therefore be accepted by the United States in good faith."

Erhard Declares Faith in Atlantic Pact, U.S. Help

PARIS (AP) — Chancellor Ludwig Erhard of West Germany declared today "we can and must rely on the Atlantic alliance."

He also said he was "sure the United States would reply with all its force if Europe or any part of Europe was attacked."

Erhard was answering a news-press question during an official two-day visit to France.

The question concerned France's independent atomic force. Erhard was asked if he thought it might lead to a European force and eventually replace a multilateral force, such as the United States is proposing.

Soviet Diplomat Ousted in Congo

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—Congo police hustled a barefoot Soviet diplomat to the airport last night and expelled him from the country, it was learned today.

The ousted official was Embassy Counselor Boris Voronin, one of the two Russian diplomats arrested Tuesday on charges of aiding a plot against the government.

Informed sources said Voronin was escorted to the Leopoldville airport by a heavy military guard and placed aboard an airliner for Brussels, Belgium. The soldiers prevented anyone from talking to him.

The sources also said the diplomat arrested with Voronin, embassy press attache Yuri Makotrykh, did not appear at the airport. Presumably, he was still in the custody of Congolese authorities.

Thursday Premier Cyrille Adoula ordered both men out of the country by Saturday at the latest for allegedly supporting a plot to overthrow the Congolese government.

Adoula also said that the other members of the Russian embassy in Leopoldville were no longer welcome in the Congo, and they were expected to leave the country soon.

The Russian embassy maintains about 100 people in Leopoldville, including women and children.

In Moscow Thursday, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko handed the Congolese envoy a note demanding punishment for those who arrested and manhandled Voronin and Makotrykh.

(The note did not reply to the charges of subversion. But it called the arrests "an act of arbitrariness and violence unprecedented in international relations against Soviet diplomats.")

Rocket Kills Nine Koreans In Firing Area

SEOUL, Korea (UPI)—Nine Koreans were killed and nine injured Thursday by a U.S. Army Honest John rocket while gathering scrap metal on a firing range, the Army announced today.

The Koreans, all villagers who lived near the range 20 miles north of Seoul, had been warned by the Army to leave the area before the firing. It was the largest toll from any firing range incident here.

Two Honest Johns were fired by an Army artillery unit. The Koreans rushed out to collect the scrap from the first warhead and were hit by the second.

A spokesman said they apparently counted on a longer interval between the rockets. Ordinarily, they are fired at half hour intervals, but Thursday, only a few minutes elapsed.

Attorneys Set Arguments In Halford's Rape Trial

GATESVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Arguments were to be heard today in the rape trial of Virgil Nelson Halford, accused rapist of a 9-year-old Mineral Wells girl.

Both state and defense rested yesterday after witnesses for the defense, including relatives of the accused man, told the jury he was insane.

Halford's mother, Mrs. V. S. Halford, 69, of Mineral Wells said her son had been insane all his life.

Prisoners' Killing Protested

NEW YORK (AP)—About 600 demonstrators picketed the West 100th Street station house Thursday night, protesting the killing of two prisoners last Friday.

The demonstrators, chanting and carrying signs, were protesting the killing of Victor Rodriguez and Maximo Salerno, two youths arrested for molesting tenants in an Upper West Side apartment house.

Patrolman James Edmushen said he shot the pair after Rodriguez pulled a gun and fired a wild shot in the patrol car taking them to the station.

Laos Neutralists Cite Red Attack

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP)—The Laotian neutralist army reported today that Pathet Lao troops reinforced by North Vietnamese elements attacked a neutralist position at dawn yesterday at Ban Namone, 60 miles north of Vientiane.

A communique said the neutralists beat back the onslaught. It said two neutralists were killed and four wounded.

Reliable reports said neutralist and Pathet Lao patrols also exchanged fire briefly yesterday near the Plaine des Jarres airstrip.

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Silver Dollars
May Be Coined

The Bureau of the Mint probably will start turning out silver dollars again early next year, if Congress gives quick approval to a request from President Kennedy.

The President, in submitting a supplemental appropriations bill to Congress yesterday, asked for authority to transfer \$675,000 of existing funds to provide for minting of 50 million silver dollars. He said it was to meet increasing public demands for the coins, which have not been produced for many years.

A Treasury official said that most of the demands for the round dollars comes from Western states. There are now about 42 million in circulation.

In some areas of the West, the silver dollar is more prevalent than its paper counterpart. Other coins also are in short supply, and the shortage becomes more acute each year during the Christmas shopping season.

Asked whether the decision to mint the silver dollars was an indication that there had been easing of the shortage of other coins, the Treasury official indicated there has been little change over the past few months. At times, federal reserve banks have rationed coins in dispensing them to other banks.

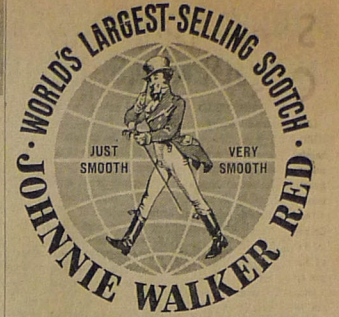

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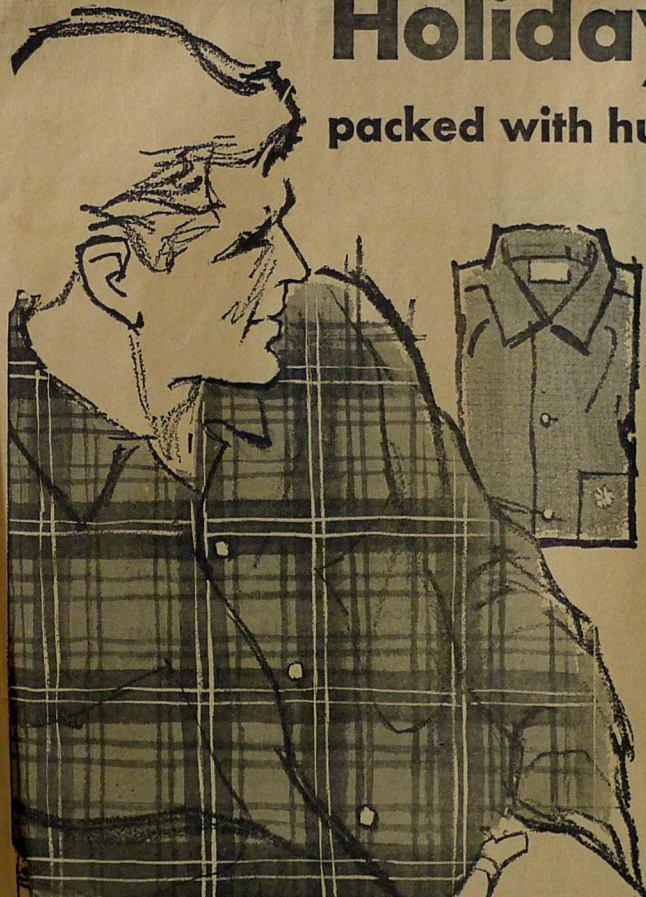
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PUBLIC SCHOOLS SEEN LOSER IN WIDER U.S. FUNDS USE

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A prominent educator charges a vigorous campaign has been mounted, in and out of Congress, to provide federal funds for private and parochial schools all the way from kindergarten through college.

Edgar Fuller, executive secretary of the Council of Chief State School Officers, made the charge in his annual report to the council. The council adopted it without a dissenting vote in a closed convention session Thursday.

Fuller said "the campaign is

active and gaining strength. Unless it is blunted the public schools will be financially undermined in thousands of American communities."

The council is an organization of state superintendents and commissioners of education from the 50 states and from U.S. possessions overseas.

The council, Fuller said, is committed by policy "to oppose any legislation which would divert the public tax dollar for distribution to private institutions of education at any level for the institutional use of the schools or colleges."

The council does not object

to the use of federal funds by private colleges and universities "for such non-institutional uses as research contracts, scholarships, fellowships and the like."

He singled out for particular criticism the powerful American Council on Education, the leadership of the 880,000-member National Education Association, and a bill introduced in Congress by Rep. James Delaney.

Delaney's proposed legislation, which he calls the "GI bill for children," would authorize general federal payments to parents of private school chil-

dren, and equal payments to public school districts for public school children.

"The temptation," Fuller said "would be for a predominantly Methodist community to establish Methodist schools, and for communities with concentrations of Lutherans, Jews, Muslims, Baptists and Black Muslims or other denominations to do the same."





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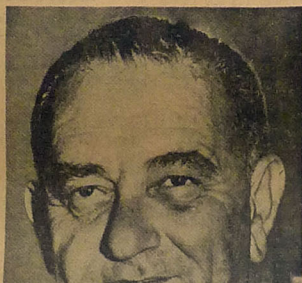

JOHNSON BECOMES PRESIDENT

In a solemn and sorrowful hour, with a nation mourning its dead President, Lyndon B. Johnson Friday took the oath of office as the 36th chief executive of the United States.

Following custom, the oath-taking took place quietly—only an hour and a half after the assassination of President Kennedy.

Federal Judge Sarah T. Hughes of Dallas administered the oath in a hurriedly arranged ceremony at 2:39 p.m. aboard Air Force 1, the presidential plane that brought Kennedy on his ill-fated Texas trip and on which his body was taken back to Washington.

Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Kennedy, her stocking still flecked with blood from the assassination, flanked the vice-president as he raised his right hand in the forward compartment of the presidential jetliner at Love Field. About 25 White House staff members and friends were present as Johnson intoned the familiar oath: "I do solemnly swear that I will perform the duties of President of the United States to the best of my ability, and defend, protect and preserve the Constitution of the United States."

The 55-year-old Johnson, the first Texan ever to become President, turned and kissed his wife on the cheek, giving her shoulders a squeeze. Then he put his arm around Mrs. Kennedy, kissing her gently on her right cheek.

Mrs. Kennedy, in tears, was wearing the same bright pink suit she wore on the fatal ride, a ride in which she had been wildly acclaimed by friendly, cheering crowds in Dallas before rifle shots rang out and the President collapsed in the seat of the car beside her.

Johnson had deliberately delayed the ceremony to give Kennedy's widow time to compose herself for one of the grueling aspects of her husband's assassination.

Gov. Connally Resting Well

Gov. John Connally — felled Friday by a sniper's bullet in the back—rested in "quite satisfactory" condition late Friday night at Parkland Hospital following nearly four hours of surgery in the afternoon.

An aide for the governor reported at 10:30 p.m. that the governor was asleep and resting comfortably following the incident which claimed President Kennedy's life.

Meanwhile, Dr. Tom Shires, chief of surgeons at University of Texas Southwestern Medical School, said Connally barely missed a fatal wound.

Impact Shattering To World Capitals

Word of President Kennedy's assassination struck the world's capitals with shattering impact, leaving heads of state and the man in the street stunned and grief-stricken.

While messages of condolence poured into the White House from presidents, premiers and crowned heads, the little people of many lands reacted with numb disbelief.

In Moscow, a Russian girl walked weeping along the street. At U.N. headquarters in New York, delegates of 11 nations bowed their heads in a moment of silence.

Within two hours, Vice-President Lyndon Johnson was sworn in as the nation's 36th President inside the presidential plane before departing for Washington.

The gunman also seriously wounded Texas Gov. John Connally, who was riding with the President.

Four Hours in Surgery

Connally spent four hours on an operating table, but his condition was reported as "quite satisfactory" at midnight.

The assassin, firing from the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository Building near the Triple Underpass sent a Mouser 6.5 rifle bullet smashing into the President's head.

An hour after the President died, police hauled the 24-year-old suspect, Lee Harvey Oswald, out of an Oak Cliff movie house.

He had worked for a short time at the depository, and police had encountered him while searching the building shortly after the assassination. They turned him loose when he was identified as an employe but put out a pickup order on him when he failed to report for a work roll call.

He also was accused of killing a Dallas policeman, J. D. Tippit, whose body was found during the vast manhunt for the President's assassin.

Oswald, who has an extensive pro-Communist background, four years ago renounced his American citizenship in Russia and tried to become a Russian citizen. Later, he returned to this country.

Friendly Crowd Chered Kennedy

Shockingly, the President was shot after driving the length of Main Street through a crowd termed the largest and friendliest of his 2-day Texas visit. It was a good-natured crowd that surged out from the curbs almost against the swiftly moving presidential car. The protective bubble had been removed from the official convertible.

Mrs. Connally, who occupied one of the two jump seats in the car, turned to the President a few moments before and remarked, "You can't say Dallas wasn't friendly to you."

At Fort Worth, Kennedy had just delivered one of the most well-received speeches of his ca-

FUNERAL FOR PRESIDENT WILL BE HELD ON MONDAY

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy's funeral will be held Monday at St. Matthews Roman Catholic Cathedral, the White House announced Friday night.

The body of the slain President will lie in repose at the White House Saturday and will lie in state in the rotunda of the Capitol on Sunday and Monday.

The President's body will be taken a couple of miles to the cathedral at 11 a.m. (EST) Monday. There, Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston and close friend of the Kennedy family, will celebrate a pontifical requiem Mass at noon.

Aging White House Press Secretary Andrew T. Hatcher said he did not know where Kennedy will be buried. There has been one report, still unconfirmed, that burial would be in the family plot in Brookline, Mass.

The President's body will be moved from the White House in an official cortege to the Capitol rotunda at 1 p.m. Sunday. This ceremony will be attended by members of the

GRAY CLOUDS WENT AWAY

Day Began as Auspiciously As Any in Kennedy's Career

It was a day that started as auspiciously as any in the career of John F. Kennedy.

When we boarded the Presidential jetliner, Air Force One, at Fort Worth at midmorning, the White House party was in high spirits. The Fort Worth welcome had been a tremendous one. Shortly before the 15-minute flight to Love Field, ugly gray clouds were swept away by a brisk breeze. The sun was out, and the Texas sky was a vivid blue.

President and Mrs. Kennedy, she strikingly attired in a pink

suit with a pert matching hat, made an instant hit at Love Field as they shook hands with hundreds of persons along the fence line.

Then the last journey began. The big open Lincoln car moved out smoothly, carrying Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy and Gov. John Connally and his wife, Nellie.

Three cars back was the press pool car, in which three other newspapersmen and I rode. Just ahead of us were Dallas Mayor and Mrs. Earle Cabell and Rep. Ray Roberts of McKinney.

Malcolm Kiddiff, assistant presidential press secretary, was with us, and as we moved into the heart of the city Kiddiff expressed elation over the friendly nature of the welcome and the great outpouring of people.

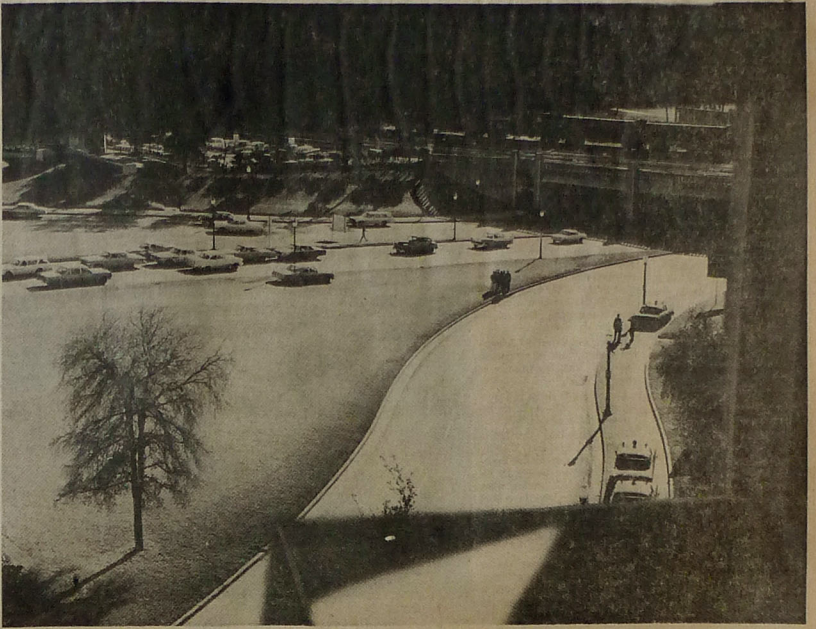
Everyone in the press car

agreed it was one of the most cordial receptions the President had received in quite a while. Blued by the cheers of the multitudes on Main Street, our motorcade moved on past the courthouse. Then came the approach to the Triple Underpass, with the leading cars picking up speed as the crowd thinned out somewhat. Over to our right loomed the gaunt structure labeled the Texas State School Book Depository.

It was 12:30 p.m. The sharp crack of a rifle rang out. But at that moment we couldn't believe it was just that. "What the hell was that?" someone in our car asked.

Then there were two more shots—measured carefully. We saw people along the street diving for the ground.

SEVEN HAVE DIED IN OFFICE, FOUR BY ASSASSIN'S HAND

Since 1841, seven U.S. presidents, including John F. Kennedy, have died in office, four of them by assassination. Ironically, death removed from office all of those elected in years ending in a zero.

- William Henry Harrison, the first to die, was elected in 1796. He died of pneumonia on Sept. 4, 1841.
- Abraham Lincoln, elected in 1860, was assassinated April 14, 1865.
- James A. Garfield, elected in 1880, was shot on July 2, 1881, and died Sept. 9.
- William McKinley, was shot by an assassin Sept. 6, 1901, and died Sept. 14. He was elected in 1900.
- Warren G. Harding, elected in 1920, died of natural causes on Aug. 22, 1923.
- Franklin D. Roosevelt, elected in 1940, died April 12, 1945, of natural causes.
- John F. Kennedy, elected in 1960, was assassinated on Nov. 22, 1963.

OTHER ATTEMPTS Assassins' Bullets Killed 4 Presidents

WASHINGTON (AP)—John F. Kennedy is the fourth U.S. president to die at the hands of assassins. Here are those who have been killed by gunfire: Abraham Lincoln died April 15, 1865, shot by John Wilkes Booth while he was attending Ford's Theater here. James A. Garfield died Sept. 19, 1881, after having been shot by Charles J. Guiteau on July that year. Garfield was gunned down while he was passing through the railroad station here about to take a vacation trip. William McKinley died Sept. 14, 1901, shot by an anarchist eight days earlier while he was attending the Pan American Exposition in Buffalo, N.Y. Kennedy died Friday, slain by a hidden sniper while driving down a street in Dallas. Assassination attempts have stepped up in recent years. Only Dwight D. Eisenhower, among the last four American presidents, was not subject of an attempt to slay him. Franklin D. Roosevelt was shot in Miami Feb. 15, 1933, while he was president-elect. Giuseppe Zangara, an unemployed bricklayer with an ulcerated stomach shot at FDR and killed Mayor Anton Cermak of Chicago. "I hate all presidents," Zangara said. Roosevelt's life was saved when a woman seized Zangara's arm as he fired. Cermak died March 5. Two Puerto Ricans attempted on Nov. 2, 1950, to storm Blair House where President Harry S. Truman was living during renovation of the White House. One assassin was killed, the other wounded and three White House guards were wounded, one fatally. The wounded assassin, Osvaldo Collazo, was sentenced to die, but Truman commuted his sentence to life imprisonment. Lincoln's assassin was tracked down and slain by soldiers. Garfield's slayer, a disappointed office seeker, was hanged. McKinley's demoralized attacker also was executed, as was FDR's attacker.

Witness From The News Describes Assassination

(The following eyewitness account was written by a Dallas News staff writer.)

Four of us from Women's News, Maggie Brown, Aurelia Alonzo, my roommate Ann Donaldson, and myself had decided to spend our lunch hour by going to see the President.

We took our lunch along—some crackers and apples—and started walking down Houston Street. We decided to cross Elm and wait there on the grassy slope just east of the Triple Underpass, a area there weren't very many people there and we could get a better view.

WE HAD BEEN waiting about half an hour when the first motorcycle escort came by, followed shortly by the President's car. The President was looking straight ahead and we were afraid we would not get to see his face but we started clapping and cheering and both he and Mrs. Kennedy turned, and smiled and waved, directly at us, it seemed. Jackie was wearing a beautiful pink suit with beret to match. Two of us, who had seen the President last during the final weeks of the 1960 campaign, remarked almost simultaneously how relaxed and robust he looked.

As it turned out, we were almost certainly the last faces he noticed in the crowd.
AFTER ACKNOWLEDGING our cheers, he faced forward again and suddenly there was a horrible, ear-shattering noise coming from behind us and a little to the right. My first reaction, and also my friends', was that as a joke, someone had backfired their car. Apparently the driver and occupants of the President's car had the same impression, because instead of speeding up, the car came almost to a halt.

Things are a little hazy from this point, but I don't believe anyone was hit with the first bullet. The President and Mrs. Kennedy turned and looked around, as if they, too, didn't believe the noise was really coming from a gun. Then after a moment's pause there was another shot and I saw the President start slumping in the car.

This was followed rapidly by another shot. Mrs. Kennedy stood up in the car, turned half way around, then fell on top of her husband's body. Not until this moment did it sink in what accounts for the most unusual precautions were taken by Teddy Roosevelt. He didn't depend exclusively on the Secret Service for protection. His biography reports: "He almost always carried a large revolver with him." Nevertheless, Theodore Roosevelt was shot and wounded slightly during a speech at Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 14, 1912, while he was trying to make a comeback to the presidency.

Roosevelt insisted on finishing his speech before he permitted doctors to treat his wound.

HOOPER VOICES
NEW YORK (UPI) — Former President Herbert Hoover, 89 and ailing, received the news of President Kennedy's assassination Friday in his Waldorf Tower apartment and said he was "shocked and grieved."

His loved America and has given his life for his country; the former president said, "I join our bereaved nation in heartfelt sympathy to Mrs. Kennedy and their two children."



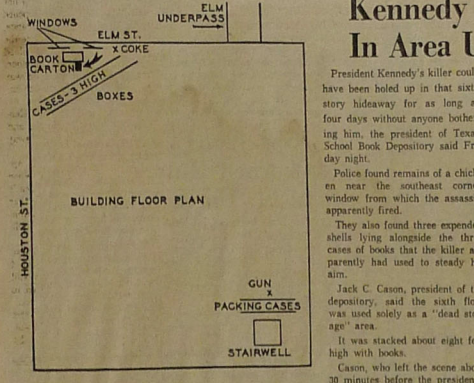
Bullets came from the sixth floor of Texas School Book Depository.

STORAGE FLOOR Kennedy Killer Hid In Area Used Little

President Kennedy's killer could have been holed up in that sixth story hideaway for as long as four days without anyone bothering him, the president of Texas School Book Depository said Friday night. Police found remains of a chicken near the southeast corner window from which the assassin apparently fired. They also found three expended shells lying alongside the three crates of books that the killer apparently had used to steady his aim. Jack C. Cason, president of the depository, said the sixth floor was used solely as a "dead storage" area. It was stacked about eight feet high with books. Cason, who left the scene about 30 minutes before the president's caravan rode down Main Street, a block away, said the firm often had difficulty finding employees who had fallen asleep amidst the stacks of books. "Sometimes it will be three or four days without anybody going up to the sixth floor to get anything," Cason said. He said the "dead storage" area was used to keep books already stocked in the basement and on the second and fourth floors. Only when they run out of copies there does anybody generally go to the sixth floor.

Speech Canceled By Goldwater
GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP)—Kent County Republican Headquarters said Friday Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., has cancelled his scheduled Saturday appearance here.

He was to have been the main speaker at a \$100-a-plate fund-raising dinner which expected to attract about 1,000 persons. Spokesmen for the Kent County GOP Committee said the dinner will be rescheduled for December or January. Goldwater, a front-runner for the GOP presidential nomination in 1964, notified the Kent County group by telephone call following word that President Kennedy had been assassinated.

Most Dallas Firms, Offices Shut Doors

Most Dallas business firms and governmental offices closed their doors Friday afternoon in a final tribute to President Kennedy. All Dallas city offices were closed, and a spokesman at the Dallas County Courthouse reported that most offices there were closed between 2 and 3 p.m. City offices in towns surrounding Dallas, however, were still open late Friday afternoon, except for University Park.

"Mayor Roy C. Coffee ordered the offices closed about 2:30 p.m., and the employees sent home," said a University Park official. But city offices in other county towns remained open, including Highland Park, Richardson, Grand Prairie, Arlington and others. The city's amusement centers also were paying a last tribute to the President.

Theater chains announced that their movie houses would be closing the remainder of the day Friday—most closed about 2 p.m. Included among these were Interstate Theaters, operating a string of 10 Dallas theaters; Trans-Texas Theaters, with two Dallas theaters as well as eight others in Fort Worth, Wichita Falls, Denton, El Paso and Austin; Tri-State with four Dallas theaters and Rowley United Theaters, which operates four theaters in the city.

Several night clubs, bars and private clubs also announced plans to remain closed Friday night. Military Bases Will Fire Guns Each Half Hour
WASHINGTON (AP) — A gun will thunder each half hour from dawn to dusk Saturday at each Army and Marine Corps base to render honor to the late President Kennedy, commander-in-chief.

A similar ritual will be followed by Navy ships in port. The Air Force, with no specific regulations for such an occurrence, was preparing to dispatch orders along to the same lines. Army regulations provide that at each base and at West Point troops be paraded at 11 a.m., and the official order announcing the death of the President be read in the troops.

On the day of the funeral, a 21-gun salute is fired at noon they had closed their offices at each base.

Johnson Receives Bipartisan Support

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Lyndon B. Johnson assumed the burdens of the presidency Friday night and immediately won the praise of bipartisan congressional leaders in the first days following President Kennedy's assassination.

The new President, who took over with an appeal for the help of God and the American people, held a mid-evening meeting with House and Senate leaders of both parties after conferring with several top administration officials.

In his first public statement after becoming President, Johnson promised the nation to "do my best."

Johnson, only a few cars back when an assassin's bullet felled the president in a Dallas motorcade, held the conference almost immediately after he arrived back in the capital on the plane which also returned President Kennedy's body.

AFTER THE MEETING with congressional leaders, the White House issued a brief statement saying that the new President had asked Democratic and Republican members of the House and Senate for their "united support in the face of the tragedy that has befallen our country."

"He said that it is more essential than ever before that this country be united," the statement said. "The legislative leaders of both parties assured President Johnson of their bipartisan cooperation."

The new President also conferred with Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara; George McGovern, White House adviser on national security affairs and Under Secretary of State George Ball, presumably on foreign and defense matters.

IN ADDITION, the Chief Executive talked by telephone with former Presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower and Harry Truman. The White House said former President Herbert Hoover also had been contacted. It did not say in what manner.

Eisenhower and Truman were scheduled to arrive in Washington during the weekend to join mourners when President Kennedy's body lies in state at the Capitol Sunday and Monday. The White House said the elderly Hoover indicated he could not get to Washington.

LEAVES SCHOOL

Johnson's Daughter Faces Different Life

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lucy Johnson, dark haired 16-year-old daughter of Lyndon B. Johnson, came home from school Friday at 3:30 p.m. to a different life.

A black police car led the way for the automobile in which Lucy rode through the gate and up the driveway to the Johnson home on a hill in Northwest Washington.

'Act of Maniac' Not Tied to City: Cabell

A somber Mayor Earle Cabell joined a stunned City Council Friday in grieving over the assassination of President John F. Kennedy—but he rejected the idea of a permanent penance for Dallas.

"There are maniacs all over the world and in every city of the world. This was a maniac. It could have happened in Padua, as well as in Dallas," said the mayor.

Reasonable people outside Dallas, believed Cabell, will realize that this was the action of a maniac—with no relationship to the people of the community.

Mayor Pro Tem Carie Welch said: "This still should not reflect on the image or character of Dallas. There were too many sincere people extending Mr. Kennedy a warm greeting, filling the streets, standing along the roadway, challenging anybody who says this reflects the character of the people of Dallas. This was the horrible action of a mentally deranged person. I just cannot conceive yet that it happened here."

Mrs. Tracy H. Rutherford, who joined in the council's quick designation of a day of prayer and mourning from midnight Friday to midnight Saturday, was too loath to attend the Trade Mart luncheon.

"I had left the office and gone home," said Mrs. Rutherford. "I ordered an all-out investigation of the attempt Friday and the lives of President Kennedy and Gov. John Connally of Texas."

On his way to the city, he said, he thought the first explosion came from a "torpedo" or giant firecracker.

"Then there were two or three more, and I knew what it was. I thought it was a 30-gauge—I've heard too many of those in the woods. Then I saw the President and Governor stretched out in the car—and we were on our way to the hospital."

What will Friday's tragedy add to an earlier incident in which United Nations Ambassador Adlai Stevenson last month was spotted near an struck with a sign-doll to Dallas?

"That is hard to say," said Cabell. "We know that it will be harmful. But the whole community must not be made to suffer for this deed."

HOOPER ORDERS FULL PROBE

WASHINGTON (AP) — Director J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI today ordered the Dallas FBI office to conduct a full-out investigation of the attempt Friday on the lives of President Kennedy and Gov. John Connally of Texas.

He said every Republican present offered "total help and cooperation."

Oswald Asked Aid To Return to U.S.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Lee Harvey Oswald of Fort Worth wrote Sen. John Tower in January 1962 from the Soviet Union asking the senator's assistance in returning to the United States.

(A man with the same name was being held in Dallas as a suspect in the assassination of President Kennedy.)

House Un-American Activities Committee records identify Oswald as secretary of the New Orleans chapter of Fair Play for Cuba, an organization sympathetic with the Castro regime.

Records also show that in a radio debate in New Orleans in the summer of 1962, Oswald identified himself as a Marxist.

IN CHECKING on the matter, Tower's office was advised by the State Department that Oswald had renounced his citizenship and affirmed his allegiance to the Soviet Union. Tower's office also was told by a State Department congressional contact that the department would possibly finance Oswald's return on a loan basis.

Tower's office was told Oswald's mother lived in Vernon and would be unable to pay the return fare for Oswald and his wife. Oswald's wife was pregnant at the time.

A State Department file shows that one Lee H. Oswald wrote the U.S. embassy in the Soviet Union asking for arrangements for a loan from the embassy or some other organization for part of the airplane fare.

THE AMERICAN consul in Moscow, Samuel C. Wise, answered Oswald on Jan. 15, 1962. State Department records show that Oswald had written Oswald to come to the embassy to discuss a loan for travel expenses.

It was not determined how Oswald returned to this country, or when, in January, 1962. Miss Linda Lee Lovelady of Odessa, Texas, executive secretary, handled the letter from Oswald at the time of the correspondence.

Following is the text of the letter from Oswald to Tower from Miss Lovelady.

"YOU COULDN'T forget a letter like that one," she said. "Especially when you learn someone like my Soviet wife (who applied at the U.S. embassy, Moscow, July 8, 1960, for immigration status to the U.S.A.) to a citizen of the United States of America and I beseech you, Senator Tower, to raise a question of holding by the Soviet Union of a citizen of the United States against his wife and expressed desire to return to his country."

Following RECEIPT of the letter, Tower's office wrote the State Department, on Jan. 26, 1962, asserting that Oswald's letter should have been addressed to the executive branch.

"For this reason, I am forwarding this correspondence to you for whatever action the department may consider appropriate," Sen. Tower wrote Fred G. Dalton, assistant secretary of state for congressional relations.

Subsequently, a few days later, Mass. Lovelady received a call from Mr. Stanfield of the State Department regarding Oswald's case. She was told that Oswald had requested that his American citizenship be re-instated and that he be affirmed his allegiance to the United States.

DA Predicts Insanity Plea By Oswald

Prosecutors said Friday they anticipate Lee H. Oswald will plead insanity if he stands trial on charges of murdering President Kennedy.

"This is the type of case where you can expect the defense to enter an insanity plea," Dist. Atty. Henry Wade observed.

As a result, prosecutors are expected to arrange for psychiatrists to examine the accused Marxist who defected to Russia and then returned to the United States.

Evidence that Oswald fled the country will provide Wade with a major jury argument.

The legal test of sanity under Texas criminal laws is whether the defendant "can distinguish between right and wrong and is aware of the nature and consequences of his acts."

Wade can argue that, since Oswald fled, it is obvious he knew the nature of his acts.

Texas does not have a law which refers specifically to the murder of the President. But general murder laws would apply.

Prosecutors said a murder charge would state simply that the killer "did then and there, with malice aforethought, kill John F. Kennedy by shooting him with a gun."

Oswald Said Opposed to Authority

"He was always opposed to any kind of discipline. He seemed to hold it against people up there."

A Fort Worth policeman was describing Lee Harvey Oswald as he knew him from fifth-grade classes through eleventh-grade football practice in Fort Worth.

The policeman, who asked to remain anonymous, "if any more of those youths are running loose, as Oswald was never like any other kid."

During B Team football practice in 1959, Oswald was caught drinking water without the coach's permission. "The coach kind of flew off the handle," the officer said.

"After he repented, Oswald fled the yard back to his room. It's supposed to be a free country, a man's supposed to be able to do what he wants."

When the officer knew him, he said, Oswald was short and stocky, with a "real large neck."

The officer heard the news of Oswald's arrest while returning from testifying at a DWI trial in Fort Worth. "When I heard about Oswald's arrest, I didn't believe it."

"When I heard his name mentioned, it really wasn't surprising."

Oswald apparently didn't have any clothes in his small room. "Just a few pieces," said the housekeeper, "but he had a zipper bag he stuffed things into."

She said he liked red Westerns, but she had never noted any mail, pictures, addresses and such when she cleaned up."

FBI and Secret Service men grabbed up his few belongings before the press arrived, but Mrs. Roberts said one thing she noticed was a map of Dallas.

A police officer who helped search the man's apartment said he found "Communist literature," a picture of Red Square, and a book believed to contain Russian ration stamps.

Inspected Killer Defected to Russia in '59

Lee Harvey Oswald, charged with murdering the President and a Dallas policeman, defected to Russia in 1959.

In 1962 he returned to the U.S. In August this year he passed out pro-Castro leaflets on a New Orleans street.

On Sept. 26 President Kennedy, S. Truly and a Dallas policeman announced plans for a trip to Dallas.

A few days later Oswald got a job in the Texas School Book Depository Building, overlooking the motorcade route.

On Oct. 14 he rented a room in Dallas.

Friday Oswald was seen by R. S. Truly and a Dallas policeman in the book firm building just after a barrage of shots from the sixth floor struck President John Kennedy and Gov. John Connally.

O. V. Campbell, vice-president of the firm, said he and Truly, superintendent of the firm, were standing in front of the building at 411 Elm when the shooting started.

Campbell said he ran toward a grassy knoll west of the building where he thought the sniper had hidden. He said Truly and an officer ran into the building.

In a storage room on the first floor, the officer, gun drawn, spotted Oswald. "Does this building work here?" the officer reportedly asked Truly.

Truly, who said he had interviewed and hired Oswald a "couple of months earlier," reportedly told the policeman that Oswald was a worker.

The policeman and Truly continued their search. Oswald fled to report at a 1:15 p.m. roll call of employees. Truly reported this to police.

Truly later said Oswald came to work as a temporary warehouse worker. "He was a pretty quiet individual. His work was fine and I had no reason to believe . . . no idea the man had ever been in Russia."

In Austin, Mrs. Howard Green, wife of a state representative, said she taught Oswald in grammar school and remembered him as "an introvert" with below-average grades.

But he was "bookish," Mrs. Green indicated he seemed to seek escape in books. He did not apply himself in school. He was a "loner" who had little to do with his classmates.

She SAUGHT him in the sixth grade at Riddle Elementary School. Oswald's widowed mother, Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, brought up three sons after her husband died.

In 1939, when Oswald was staying at the Metropole Hotel in Moscow, a newspaper arranged for the mother to phone her son.

Oswald spoke two husky hullo into the state-owned telephone and hung up as his mother pleaded, "Hello . . . Hello . . . Lee?" He refused to return to the phone.

Oswald's story in his own words was related by Aline Mosby of the United Press International.

"I was born in New Orleans and lived for two years in New York. I spent most of my life in Fort Worth. My father died before I was born. My mother works in a shoe shop, mostly in Fort Worth.

many, Holland, Finland, Italy, Poland and the Soviet Union.

"I started to study Marxist economic theories. I could see the impoverishment of the masses before my own eyes in my mother. I thought the worker's life could be better. I found some Marxist books on dust shelves in the New Orleans library and continued to indoctrinate myself for five years.

"I've not just been thinking about this (defecting), I've been waiting to do it for two years, saving my money, just waiting until I got out of the Marine Corps, like waiting to get out of prison. For two years I've had it in my mind not to form any attachments because I knew I was going away.

"My mother doesn't know. She's either old. I couldn't expect her to understand. It wasn't quite fair of me to go without telling her but it's better that way."

Oswald said he would not care to live in the U.S. "where being a worker means exploitation by the capitalists.

"The U.S. has more light bulbs and hot water heaters than Russia but I don't feel that will be the case in 20 or 30 years. I want to go into electronics here and I'll feel I'm working for all the people and not an individual capitalist making a profit for himself.

"Capitalism has passed its peak. Unemployment is growing. Depression is on the way. Capitalism will disappear as feudalism disappeared. I've seen the luxuries on Park Avenue and seen the workers on the East Side.

"I would like to spend the rest of my life here and get a normal life—if that means marriage and so forth, OK.

"I've seen poor niggers (sic), being a Southern boy, and that was a lesson. People hate because they're told to hate, like school kids. It's the fashion to hate. People in the U.S. are like that in everything."

NEW ORLEANS Cuban involvement in the Canal Strait fight said Oswald had earlier attempted to infiltrate the Cuba's anti-Castro organization.

Associated Press quoted Carlos Bringuier, the Cuban, as saying, "He offered himself as a former Marine to train Cubans for an invasion.

"I was suspicious of him from the start. Frankly, I thought he might be an agent from the FBI or the CIA trying to find out what we might be up to.

"Then, a few days later, I encountered him on Canal Street distributing 'Viva Castro' literature. We took all his propaganda away from him. Then the police came and arrested a lot of us. . . . The charges against all of us but Oswald were dismissed."

Oswald is identified in House Un-American Activities Committee records as secretary of a group called "Fair Play for Cuba."

THE CUBAN STUDENT Directorate in Miami said Oswald acted as president of the Fair Play Committee in New Orleans until he was "transferred" to Dallas late in August.

The directorate said the move to Dallas followed an attack on Oswald in a debate involving the directorate on Station WDSU.

In Buffalo, N.Y., however, V. T. Lee, national director of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee denied Oswald was a leader.

Lee said Oswald wasn't a leader of any chartered chapter of the committee. "As far as our national office is concerned, we have no such person as a chairman of any of our chartered chapters."

Lee said, "I think the death of the President is a very shocking thing. . . . I deplore this action. . . . I greatly sympathize with the family of the President and with the nation as a whole because of the deplorable thing that has occurred."

The Fair Play Committee, founded in New York in 1960, is a group dedicated to supporting the government and policies of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

The group announced its formation in a full page ad in a New York newspaper. The Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, investigating the financing of the ad, found that the money came from the Cuban ministry to the United Nations.—KENT RIFFLE.

Suspect Captured In Movie Theater

"I protest this police brutality," said President Kennedy's assassin as he was dragged from the movie theater in Oak Cliff Friday afternoon.

A crowd of several hundred pressed forward, chanting, "Kill the SOB!"

Hadn't officers moved quickly with authority, 24-year-old Lee Harvey Oswald might have suffered a worse fate than the world leader he is suspected of killing.

Mrs. Julie Pospel of 2728 Seewers, cashier at the theater at 211 W. Jefferson, had called police shortly before 2 p.m. and reported "a strange-acting man."

She had been told by a shoe store manager that a man had been ducking in and out of stores as police sirens wailed in the area. She was told the man had run into the theater.

"I really don't remember if I saw him go in or not," she said, "but apparently this man was spotted assassin as police dragged him from the darkened Texas Theater in Oak Cliff Friday afternoon.

When Mrs. Pospel realized that the man said to be inside was probably the culprit the police were searching for, she told the shoe store manager and an employee of the theater to "look around in there."

They couldn't find anyone, but as they passed the back section of the middle aisle downstairs, they heard a snap snap or crack.

About this time police—only a few blocks away at the scene of the shooting of Policeman J. D. Tippit at 400 E. Jefferson—sounded an alarm into the theater.

"Watch him, he's armed," shouted no detective. "I'll get that SOB if he's in there," replied another.

Minutes later three policemen dragged the screaming, kicking ex-Marine out.

Police tried to put one of their caps over the man's face and another held his mouth shut as they piled him in an unmarked police car. Five policemen went along.

The crowd was angry, but the scene had switched too fast for it to act.

Officer M. N. McDonald was the officer who said he disarmed Oswald. He suffered a scratch along the face.

"He knew what I was there for," said Officer McDonald. "He didn't give me too much trouble."

When Oswald was captured, the movie "War is Hell" was on the screen.

Warren Lays Shots To Bigotry

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chief Justice Earl Warren said Friday President Kennedy was assassinated "as a result of the hatred and bitterness that has been injected into the life of our nation by bigots."

The comment was included in a statement mourning the fatal shooting of the President in Dallas. The text of Warren's statement:

"A great and good President has suffered martyrdom as a result of the hatred and bitterness that has been injected into the life of our nations by bigots, but his memory will always be an inspiration to Americans of good will everywhere.

"The entire world is poorer because of his passing.

"May God protect our nation in this hour of crisis."

Warren issued his statement more than an hour after a Supreme Court aide had described him as being "stunned and shocked" by news of the attack on the President.

Warren and the eight associate justices were in a closed conference considering appeals argued during the week when news of the shooting was given to them by a court official.

The conference was ended immediately. The court is also expected to cancel a regular public session scheduled for next Monday.

MacArthur Sinds Regrets to Jackie

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur, in a telegram to Mrs. Kennedy, said: "I realize the utter utility of words at such a time, but the world of civilization shares the indignity of this monumental tragedy. As a former comrade in arms, his death kills something within me."

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP)—which she said was her current occupation.

She did not divulge her age.

"Ever since he (Oswald) came back from Russia he has been persecuted. I was persecuted. My friends, if that's what you call them, turned their backs.

She did.

Logge Expresses Shock at Death Of President

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (AP)—Henry Cabot Lodge, U.S. ambassador to South Viet Nam, who was on his way to confer with President Kennedy, gaped for words in shock Friday at news of the President's assassination.

"I was very fond of him and said."

"We served in Congress together and knew each other before that in Massachusetts."

"Lately we have been particularly close because he followed—no not followed, but guided America's foreign policy. He took a keen personal interest in it and gave it a great deal of personal time."

Lodge, who passed in San Francisco on his way from a high-level policy conference on South Viet Nam in Honolulu, said he would leave Saturday morning for Washington and report to Averett Harriman, assistant secretary of state.

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"I was suspicious of him from the start. Frankly, I thought he might be an agent from the FBI or the CIA trying to find out what we might be up to.

"Then, a few days later, I encountered him on Canal Street distributing 'Viva Castro' literature. We took all his propaganda away from him. Then the police came and arrested a lot of us. . . . The charges against all of us but Oswald were dismissed."

Oswald is identified in House Un-American Activities Committee records as secretary of a group called "Fair Play for Cuba."

THE CUBAN STUDENT Directorate in Miami said Oswald acted as president of the Fair Play Committee in New Orleans until he was "transferred" to Dallas late in August.

The directorate said the move to Dallas followed an attack on Oswald in a debate involving the directorate on Station WDSU.

In Buffalo, N.Y., however, V. T. Lee, national director of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee denied Oswald was a leader.

Lee said Oswald wasn't a leader of any chartered chapter of the committee. "As far as our national office is concerned, we have no such person as a chairman of any of our chartered chapters."

Lee said, "I think the death of the President is a very shocking thing. . . . I deplore this action. . . . I greatly sympathize with the family of the President and with the nation as a whole because of the deplorable thing that has occurred."

The Fair Play Committee, founded in New York in 1960, is a group dedicated to supporting the government and policies of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

The group announced its formation in a full page ad in a New York newspaper. The Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, investigating the financing of the ad, found that the money came from the Cuban ministry to the United Nations.—KENT RIFFLE.

Red Leader Harps On Autobahn Issue

MOSCOW (AP) — Premier Khrushchev says the U.S.-Soviet dispute over policing military traffic on the road to West Berlin is more serious than the West realizes.

Khrushchev's feeling was reported Friday to a news conference by Foreign Minister Pavlov. He said he had talked with the premier at Kiev Wednesday.

Khrushchev emphasized during his talks that the Kremlin would never agree to changes in clearance procedures on the Berlin Autobahn, the Danish official said. "Mr. Khrushchev said he had the feeling that many people in the world had underestimated the severity of the situation on the highway to Berlin," Haekkerup added.

He described Khrushchev's position on the issue as very firm and reported the Soviet leader emphasized he "will not accept any change in the situation."

CHANGES IN WORSHIP

Council Approves Sweeping Reforms

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — The Ecumenical Council Friday gave final, overwhelming approval to the most sweeping reforms in Roman Catholic worship in more than 1,000 years.

The historic decree was ratified by a vote of 2,158 to 19. It will be promulgated by Pope Paul VI at a public session of the council, probably next Friday or Saturday.

The liturgical reform decree is the first major work completed by the assembly of Catholic bishops. It has been under consideration since the Ecumenical Council convened at the call of the late Pope John XXIII in the fall of 1962.

The change which will have the greatest impact on Catholic men and women in the pew is authorization for the use of modern languages instead of Latin in large sections of the Mass and in the entire rites of baptism, marriage, confession and other sacraments.

It is up to national conferences of bishops to decide when and how the change-over will take place.

Bishops from the United States, England, Canada, Australia and other English-speaking countries have appointed a special committee of scholars to begin work on an official English-language Mass.

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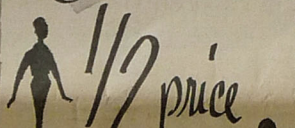

New Leader of Iraq Vows to Uphold Pacts

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — President Abdel Salam Arel said Thursday night his revolutionary regime will honor Iraq's unity agreements with Syria.

"One of the main goals of our revolution is all-Arab unity," he said in his first news conference since leading his country's armed forces in the overthrow of the Baathist Arab socialist government Monday.

Asked if unity talks started by the former government with Baathist Syria would continue and the disrupted merger moves with President Gamal Abdel Nasser's United Arab Republic would resume Arel replied: "Our talks with the others will continue for the sake of the Arab world." The conference was held in the heavily guarded presidential palace whose front wall bears a gap-

ing hole caused by a rocket attack on Nov. 13 by a disident Baathist pilot.

Correspondents were escorted to the palace through the curfew city in a convoy of military cars. Responding to written questions Arel said: "Our relations with every Arab country are simply relations between brother and brother and the same for our brother Syria. We will keep the word of every speech and every statement for serving Arab unity as a whole."

"We said in our first declaration (in Monday's coup) we will keep the word of the Iraq government before the revolution." The president defined his country's foreign policy as one of neutrality—"going to neither side but wanting peace. We look forward to friendship with all peace loving nations and full cooperation with the United Nations."

Asked by a correspondent of the Soviet Tass agency what political parties would be allowed to function he replied: "In our belief to give license to parties takes much time and study. Based on these studies we will make our decision."

No parties have been licensed since the revolution last Feb. 8 which ended the regime of dictator Abdel Karim Kassem, he said.

Arel said his regime's policy on the Kurds, who have been in rebellion since the days of Kassem's regime, would be based on equality and friendship.

Wade Calls Killing A 'Dastardly Act'

Dist. Atty. Henry Wade said he drove to his office. "I wonder if anyone has arranged for that." Friday the electric chair is "too good" for the killers of President Kennedy.

"This is the most dastardly act I've ever heard about," Wade said. "The electric chair is too good for the killers."

Wade said preliminary reports indicated more than one person was involved in the shooting which brought death to the President and left Gov. John Connally wounded.

"Everyone who participated in this crime — anyone who helped plan it or who furnished a weapon knowing the purpose for which it was intended — is guilty of murder under Texas law. They should all go to the electric chair."

Wade said the killers could stand trial in either state courts or federal courts here — or possibly in both.

If given the death penalty on murder charges in either state or federal courts, the killers would die in the electric chair at Huntsville.

Wade, a former roommate and close personal friend of Gov. Connally, was at the Dallas Trade Mart, awaiting the arrival of the Kennedy motorcade, when a News reporter told him of the shooting. "You're kidding, aren't you?" Wade asked.

U.S. Atty. Barefoot Sanders also expressed disbelief when told of the tragedy. Like Wade, Sanders was at the Trade Mart.

Then, like the veteran prosecutor that he is, Wade began thinking of evidence needed for conviction.

"We ought to have an autopsy on the President's body," he said.

Author of Open Letter Says Shooting Terrible

The man who placed a full-page open letter to President John F. Kennedy in Friday's edition of The News said the assassination of the President was "the most terrible thing that ever happened to this country."

The man, who identified himself as Bernard Weissman, said he placed the advertisement for the American Fact-Finding Committee.

Weissman said the committee was "a local organization which wanted to show its position on national issues as we are constitutionally entitled to." He declined to name any other members or to give the size of the group.

The advertisement was titled "Welcome Mr. Kennedy" and listed 12 questions the ad said the group "demand (s) answers to these questions, and we want them now."

Weissman, who declined to state his occupation, is listed in neither the telephone directory nor the city directory. He said he was not originally from Dallas but he had lived here "a while."

A post office box number was listed in the ad.

The local coordinator for the John Birch Society said he had "never heard of either Weissman or the committee." Robert Morris, past president of the Defenders of American Liberties also said he did "not know the first thing about them."

Weissman, insisting the committee was of a local nature, refused to say if there are chapters in other cities.

He answered "no comment" to other questions pertaining to the organization and further functions of the committee.

Copy for the ad was brought by a man identifying himself as Weissman to The News last week, Tuesday, he placed the order for the ad and paid two thirds of the total price in cash.

The following day Weissman read proof on the ad and paid again in cash, for the remainder of the cost.

It is doubtful that President Kennedy saw the letter. His schedule would not have permitted him much leisure time for newspaper reading.

Medal of Honor Urged for JFK

LOS ANGELES, Calif. (AP)—Rep. James Roosevelt, D-Calif., said Friday he will propose that the Congressional Medal of Honor be awarded posthumously to the late President Kennedy.

Roosevelt, son of another president who died in office, told Los Angeles County Supervisor Kenneth Hahn by telephone from Washington that he will introduce a joint resolution "in the name of the people of the United States."

Hahn had suggested the action, saying: "Certainly, in the battle of peace and human understanding, President John F. Kennedy earned his medal."

The medal of honor is the nation's highest award for heroism. Roosevelt's father, Franklin D. Roosevelt, died in 1945.

Authority Over Trial Questioned

A New York state court tried the 25-year-old laborer who shot President William McKinley as he attended the Pan-American Exposition in Buffalo.

A federal court in the District of Columbia tried a disgruntled job seeker who shot President James A. Garfield in a Washington railroad station.

A unique military commission tried seven men and a woman accused of plotting the death of President Abraham Lincoln and sheltering his killer.

That's what Chief Assistant Dist. Atty. A. D. Jim Bowie learned Friday as he checked lawbooks after the assassination of President Kennedy here.

Bowie thought court rulings in the deaths of the other presidents could shed light on whether a state or federal court should try the sniper who shot President Kennedy.

The New York court ruled Leon Golgoz should die for killing President McKinley in 1901.

Golgoz walked to the electric chair Oct. 29, 1901. Then guards lowered his body into a prison grave and filled it with quicklime and carbolic acid.

Dallas area ministers, some top Standard, who was waiting at the Trade Mart for the presidential luncheon, stated, "The whole world is engulfed in sorrow over the brutal assassination of President John F. Kennedy. Right thinking Texans will always grieve for such a dastardly crime should have been committed in our state."

"IT IS TRUE," he continued, "that many disagreed with the President on his political views, but now that he has gone, perhaps his untimely death may awaken the nation to the fact that elected officials are the servants of all the people and that the time has come for all groups to cease their unfounded accusations against people who are doing their best to serve the whole nation."

"MAY THE ALMIGHTY grant of His wisdom and counsel to our new President, Lyndon Johnson, as he assumes his new office," he added. "May God grant that all Americans unite today, as never before in our history, to keep America the home of the brave and the land of the free."

"I share the grief," Dr. William Dickinson, minister of the Highland Park Methodist Church said, "expressed by ministers, officials, and citizens of every walk of life. It is my own personal prayer and from the depth of my heart that I will commit every effort to the end that good behavior and Godliness will be the responsibility of every citizen and that I will not let remain, if it is within my power, a single citizen who is complacent about the emotional health and welfare of our city."

"OUR PRAYER," he added, "is that God will sustain the family and strengthen and comfort the peoples of the world so that this may be done on earth."

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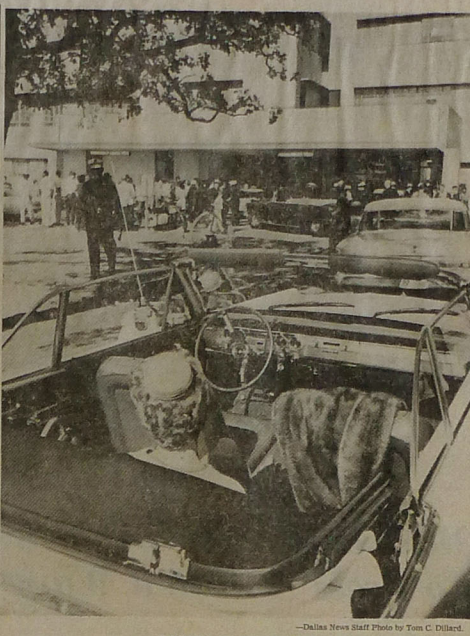
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200 Outside Hospital Gasp at Death Word

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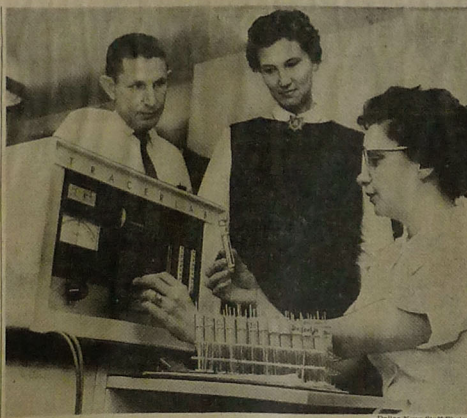

Mexican Candidate Vows To Press Anti-Red War

MEXICO CITY—Gustavo Diaz Ordaz, 52, the man Mexico's Communists hate most, promises no letup on the Reds if, as is as certain as anything in Latin politics, he is elected Mexico's next president.

Diaz Ordaz has made that clear in a statement on the heels of his nomination by the Institutional Revolutionary party.

"Liberty is an essential condition of our daily life," Diaz Ordaz says. "It is the spiritual framework for our labor. In Mexico we enjoy all freedoms except one: the freedom to wipe out all other freedoms."

That is perhaps the clearest possible warning Diaz Ordaz could give leftist agitators. It is unmistakably a statement of his intentions to pursue, as president, the policy he has followed as Mexico's interior minister.

During most of the last five years, Diaz Ordaz has been charged with responsibility for Mexico's security against extremist infiltration and subversion.

It was early in President Adolfo Lopez Mateos' administration that Interior Minister Diaz Ordaz had to carry out the arrest of Demetrio Vallejo, a Marxist labor leader, and other leftists who staged a wildcat strike on the government-run National Railways. Investigation of that walk-out led the government to invite

two Russian diplomats to leave Mexico for their part in the event.

Later, Diaz Ordaz saw to it that the world-famous Communist Marxist, David Alfaro Siqueiros, was jailed for "social dissolution."

In retaliation, the Communists waged a strong press campaign against Diaz Ordaz in the months up to his selection as official party candidate for the presidency. The Reds have gone so far as to mutter threats of armed uprising.

Some Mexican political observers felt that Diaz Ordaz might think it necessary to tone down his vigorously anti-Communist position in an effort to make himself acceptable to extreme leftists and their sympathizers. His acceptance speech indicated otherwise.

He also outlined the program of government he proposes to follow, if elected next July 5 and inaugurated Dec. 1, 1964.

Diaz Ordaz promised to respect private enterprise in Mexico but warned that his administration would not hesitate to enter economic fields where private enterprise lagged.

In general terms, Diaz Ordaz pledged continuation of the policies of President Lopez Mateos.

Diaz Ordaz acknowledged that the agrarian problem which touched off the revolution of 1910 and paved the way for agrarian reform, which has been principal plank of the PRI platform for more than 50 years, continues to be the No. 1 problem.

Toll Road Urged Instead of IH 35

TULSA, Okla. (UPI) — Gov. Henry Bellmon in a surprise move has proposed a turnpike be built instead of free Interstate 35 between Purcell and Ardmore in South Central Oklahoma.

The route is parallel to U.S. 77 between Oklahoma City and Dallas and one of the most heavily traveled highways in Oklahoma.

Oklahoma Turnpike Authority members, indicating they had some advance knowledge of the proposal, promptly authorized a feasibility study. This will include a traffic study, presumably by Wilbur Smith & Associates, and an engineering survey by H. E. Bailey, turnpike consulting engineer.

Lebanon, India Successfully Launch Rockets

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Lebanon has started celebrating the 20th anniversary of its independence by successfully launching the largest rocket ever to soar off Lebanese soil.

The 26-foot, 3-stage rocket streaked over the Mediterranean and plunged into the sea some where south of Cyprus.

After separation of the first two stages, the third stage carrying a nose cone equipped with a radio receiver and transmitter plus special fins to measure friction heat, reached an altitude of 200 kilometers.

The rocket, capable of entering outer space, weighed 1,474 pounds.

MADRAS, India (AP)—India has successfully launched a 2-stage rocket.

The Indian scientists who assembled the sodium vapor rocket were trained by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration of the United States.

The rocket, weighing 1,000 pounds and carrying a 67-pound payload of sodium vapor and equipment, soared 111 miles, developing maximum speed of 2,000 miles per hour.

Volunteers Still Needed for Tests

Work has begun in Dallas' diabetes research, but prediabetic volunteers are still needed because only about one fourth the number necessary have registered, one of the researchers said.

The doctor, who explained the part volunteers will take in the promising research project, said anyone whose parents are both diabetic is a prediabetic.

Those wishing to help in the project should call RIR-4245 to register and obtain information.

There are three major objectives in the research—to prevent or delay onset of diabetes, develop a diagnostic test for prediabetics and learn what changes convert a prediabetic to a diabetic.

Prediabetic volunteers will be the subjects in three tests, the doctor explained. In the first, "several specimens of blood are taken from a vein over a period of five hours."

"These are the usual needle sticks with which most people are familiar."

"In addition, a tiny piece of tissue will be obtained through one of the needles. . . ."

"This procedure is virtually painless. The results of these tests are made available, upon request, to the patient and to his private physician," the doctor added.

Within a year, a shorter test which takes less than two hours, is given to obtain blood specimens.

Before the blood samples are taken, the volunteer drinks glucose, which is sugar in the form in which it usually appears in the blood. The body's response to the sugar load is then measured with the blood samples.

The tissue taken "will be examined under the electron microscope for evidence of the capillary blood vessel disease," the doctor said.

He explained that despite the discovery of insulin in 1921, which has provided a means of controlling the high blood sugar levels in diabetes, "a very serious problem remains unsolved."

"Careful treatment with insulin and other drugs fail, in most cases, to prevent disease of the smallest blood vessels of the body (capillaries) which can produce a variety of grave consequences."

"If the capillaries of the eyes become involved, blindness may result; if the blood vessels of the heart or kidneys become involved, heart disease or kidney failure may result; if the blood vessels to the legs are involved, ulcers or gangrene may result."

"The problem at hand is how to

stop the progression of this disease. . . . By examining the blood and tissue specimens from prediabetics, we hope to find some defect or "sign" that suggests approaches to answering their parents have almost a 100 percent chance to eventually develop diabetes—the scientists hope.

Last Speech Lauds TFX, Given Ovation

FORT WORTH, Texas—The controversial TFX warplane was the subject of the last speech ever made by President Kennedy.

He never got to see the jet fighter which—not long before his death from an assassin's bullet Friday—he called a powerful force for freedom. His speech was given a long, standing ovation.

Just before he departed for Dallas from Carswell Air Force Base, he decided against visiting nearby General Dynamics-Fort Worth builder of the plane.

Time was running out for his trip to Dallas, Secret Service agents pointed out.

They didn't know how little time he actually had left.

Kennedy spoke on the F111 (commonly called the TFX for "tactical fighter, experimental") at a breakfast in his honor at Hotel Texas Friday morning.

The awarding of the TFX contract to General Dynamics-Fort

Worth has been a hot political issue, with opponents charging "political favoritism."

President Kennedy had remained out of the controversy.

But speaking to an overflow crowd of 2,000 in the hotel ballroom, Kennedy said the F111, true worth has been relatively overlooked in discussions of how the contract was awarded.

He said the F111 would "serve the forces of freedom in a manner no airplane on earth can match."

"There has been a good deal of discussion of the long and hard fought competition to win the F111 contract," he said, "but relatively little discussion of what this revolutionary plane will be able to do."

The President cited Texas as being first among all the states in prime military procurement contracts and second in the number of military personnel on active duty.

"I do not recite these facts for partisan purposes," he said.

"So long as international Communism threatens peace, so long as fear and oppression are abroad, so long as force is regarded by any nation as an instrument of national policy—we must have the power to deter others from aggression," the President said.

The President cited this city's importance to the nation's efforts to win peace.

"During the days of World War II, the great Liberator Bombers—ones of which was flown by my brother—were produced here.

"The first non-stop flight around the world took off and returned here, in a plane built by your factories (B32).

"The first truly intercontinental bomber, the B36 was produced here.

"The B58—still considered the finest weapon system of its class in the world—is a Fort Worth product.

"The Iroquois helicopter from Fort Worth's Bell plant is our mainstay in Viet Nam.

"So wherever the confrontation may occur—Berlin, Viet Nam, Cuba or elsewhere—the workmanship of Fort Worth provides all of us with a sense of security."

The public will be permitted to file past the bier shortly after its arrival until 9 p.m. Sunday and from 9 until 10 a.m. Monday, the White House said.

Kennedy's body will lie in repose in the east room of the White House from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. Saturday. The White House said Kennedy's immediate family will be present then from 10 to 11 a.m.

President Johnson, House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., and Earl Warren, Chief Justice of the United States, are scheduled to arrive between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower will be present at that time, the White House said.

Former President Herbert Hoover expressed regret that he would be unable to attend. Former President Harry S. Truman is planning to arrive in Washington Sunday.

Associate justices of the Supreme Court and members of the federal judiciary are to be present from 2 to 2:30 p.m.

Between 2:30 and 5 p.m. members of Congress and governors are scheduled to arrive.

The diplomatic corps will follow between 5 and 6 p.m.

Cardinal Cushing, who will say the funeral mass, gave the invocation at the President's inauguration, officiated at his marriage, baptized the two Kennedy children, and presided at the funeral mass for Patrick Bouvier Kennedy, the first family's son who died within 40 hours after birth last August.

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Bishop Gorman Sends Message From Rome

"This tragedy has brought recent events throughout the world home to us. We may now realize more fully what violent solution of real or imaginary dissatisfaction really means and be awakened to the violence that is rampant throughout our modern troubled world," he added.

"In these days of violent political upheavals," he continued, "it is deeply to be regretted that even in our country of democratic traditions, the growing resort to violence in so many nations should once again have taken violent form in a successful effort by irresponsible persons . . . to take the life of the President of the United States.

"Naturally, I am very pleased," he stated, "to learn from the reports that our Dallas priests were on the alert and able to give this fine Catholic man, the first President of our Faith, the consolations of the last Sacraments.

"May God grant this great Catholic man, an historic personality in the history of the United States, eternal rest and peace. May his countrymen honor him with the peace he deserves, in the story of American life," he stated.

She shook hands, smiled and drew leaves from crowds in San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth and —along the motorcade route where the assassin waited—in Dallas.

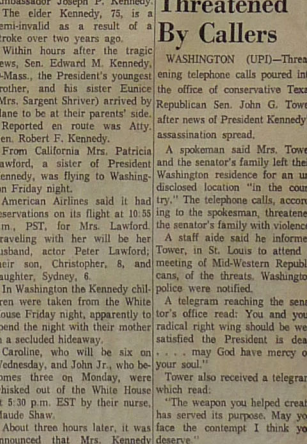

First Cuban Crisis Came Early

The crisis involving Cuba was Kennedy's first with that small Caribbean island. Soon after he was inaugurated Jan. 20, 1961, Cuban refugees with United States backing invaded their homeland in an attempt to wrest it from Castro. The invasion was a fiasco.

Castro's Russian-built military might crushed the invasion. Anticipated defections from Castro's forces failed to materialize. And the United States did not come to the invaders' aid militarily. U.S. prestige abroad was damaged. While the invasion was in progress Khrushchev warned Kennedy to "call a halt to the aggression or else Russia would give the necessary assistance in restoring the invasion. But the President replied:

"In the event of any military intervention by outside forces, we will immediately honor our obligations under the inter-American system to protect this hemisphere against external aggression. Later in a speech he warned Communist forces and non-Communist friends that the United States would act on its own against Cuba if ships carrying them United States security was threatened. This is what he did in October, 1962.

Post-Quarantine Days Tense

A week before preparations for his broadcast aerial surveillance had obtained evidence of missile sites ready and being prepared in Cuba. The public was not told there were days and nights of debate and action by the Kennedy administration until the blockade decision was reached.

The days following the quarantine announcement were tense. Military forces were built up along the Southeast. The Organization of American States met the next day and unanimously adopted a resolution offering to investigate the State Dean Rusk authorizing the use of force individually or collectively to enforce the blockade. With that legal backing, Kennedy issued the proclamation making effective at 10 a.m. the next day. Twenty-five Russian ships were reported en route to Cuba.

Meanwhile, United Nations Secretary General U. Thant asked both Kennedy and Khrushchev to suspend both the arms blockade and arms shipment for three or three weeks. Both agreed. Washington agreed to cooperate to avoid a confrontation.

Twenty hours after the proclamation was issued, a Russian ship carrying oil was intercepted. It was allowed to proceed.

Crisis Eased, Problem Remained

Although the crisis eased, Cuba remained a problem. Cuban called in the United States to help in the release of the 114 detained captives during the ill-fated invasion of 1961. An effort to ransom the prisoners failed because of Castro's insistence that they be brought free in Cuba.

Finally, through private negotiations conducted with Castro by James B. Donovan, a New York lawyer skilled in undercover negotiation, another agreement was reached. Drugs and baby food was agreed upon and 1,113 imprisoned Cubans were flown to Miami just before Christmas 1962.

Administration leaders claimed that the 87th Congress which met in 1961 and 1962 adopted 90 per cent of the President's program. Senate Minority Leader Everett Dirksen said, "Never in the history of the nation has the Congress spent so much time accomplishing so little as it did in the second session of the 87th Congress."

Democrats continued in control of the 88th Congress which opened in January 1962. The 1962 off-year election increased Democratic representation in the Senate from 64 to 68, reducing the Republican minority from 36 seats to 32. There were 239 Democrats in the House against 176 Republicans in contrast to 261 Democrats and 139 Republicans in the 87th Congress.

A coalition of conservative Democrats from the South and conservative Republicans from the North thwarted the President's program in its favor. The 87th Congress rejected his proposals for Federal aid to public elementary and secondary schools, health insurance for the aged under Social Security, Cabinet Department of Urban Affairs, strict controls on production of surplus farm crops and standards of authority in public works projects and reduce income taxes to combat economic recessions.

Among the new Senators was the President's youngest brother, Edward M. Teddy Kennedy, who was elected in Massachusetts to the first seat occupied by the President. His appearance in the Senate meant that the three Kennedy brothers were in the Federal government.

The Congress approved an increase in the minimum wage from \$1 an hour to \$1.25. It increased Social Security benefits and liberalized requirements for qualifying under the program. It passed a Trade Expansion Act which gave the President an unprecedented grant of new tariff-cutting powers to use as a bargaining lever for mutual tariff concessions by the European Common Market and other non-Communist countries. It approved establishment of a private corporation to develop, own and operate a communications satellite system. New Federal powers to protect the public against hazardous drugs were granted. New postal rates, including a rise from 4 to 5 cents for first class letters, were adopted.

After much wrangling and maneuvering, a Civil Rights bill was passed. It was a bipartisan compromise bill with bipartisan support. Prospects of House adoption appeared good, but there was opposition in the Senate and a matter of time that cast a shadow over the bill.

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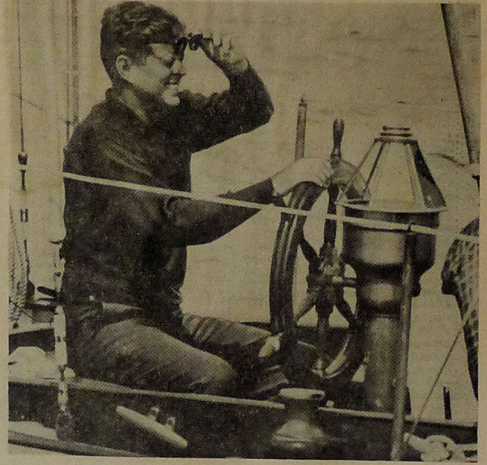

Grim Sports World Alters Plans

A shocked, mumbled athletic world Friday shared a nation's grief at the assassination of President Kennedy.

Many athletic events, in Dallas, Texas and over the nation were canceled or postponed in memorial tribute to the President.

More than 30 college and professional football games scheduled Saturday and Sunday were postponed or canceled.

Two of the three Southwest Conference games were postponed.

Shortly after 10 p.m. SMU athletic director Matty Bell announced that the Mustangs' Saturday afternoon game with Baylor has been postponed. A little less than an hour later TCU announced that its scheduled game with Rice at Fort Worth also had been postponed. Both games probably will be played Dec. 7, a week after most SWC schools play final regularly scheduled games.

Late Friday night, Arkansas and Texas Tech officials had made no announcement that their game at Fayetteville, Ark., would be postponed. Arkansas coach

Frank Broyles said the game likely would not be played.

The Southwest Conference office had said early in the day that decision on whether to play must be left up to individual schools.

Other college games within the state to be called off were North Texas vs. Southern Illinois at Denton, Hardin-Simmons vs. Arlington State at Arlington, Wyoming vs. Texas Western and Trinity vs. Arkansas State.

Included among the postponements were the full-state of American Football League professional games for Sunday. The AFL made the announcement several hours after the American Broadcasting Company announced it would not televise the games Sunday as usual.

The National Football League said that its schedules of seven games would be played Sunday but the Columbia Broadcasting System will not televise the games.

The first college game to be canceled was the game between Harvard, the alma mater of President Kennedy, and Yale. A

Harvard spokesman said the game probably would not be rescheduled. Harvard and Yale were to have played the 80th game in the most historic and hallowed of all the nation's traditional football rivalries.

The Harvard-Yale game was one of three games scheduled to be telecast regionally Saturday by CBS. The network announced early in the afternoon that it was canceling those telecasts. The Harvard-Yale game already had been canceled, however.

As the afternoon and evening wore on, many other games were postponed or canceled, including the Wisconsin-Minnesota game scheduled for regional TV. The third game to be telecast, Clemson-South Carolina, will be played. Other games postponed or canceled included the entire schedule of the Big 6 Conference on the West Coast which could have determined a Rose Bowl host team.

The NCAA, through executive-secretary Walter Byers, late in the afternoon announced that decisions on whether to play would be left to the colleges but asked that all games played include

an appropriate, dignified opening ceremony" and possibly other memorial tributes to the President.

Other events called off were Friday night's National and American League hockey games, all New York state racing until after the President's funeral, Friday racing at Rhode Island and Maryland tracks and the third round of the Cajun Golf Classic scheduled Saturday at Lafayette, La. It will be played Sunday.

At West Point, N.Y., an Army spokesman said a decision has not yet been reached on whether to play the traditional Army-Navy football game in Philadelphia Nov. 30.

At least six games involving Dallas County high schools were called off. They were South Oak Cliff-Woodrow Wilson, postponed until 7:30 p.m. Saturday at Cobb stadium, Irving at Arlington, postponed until 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Highland Park at Sherman, postponed until 7:30 p.m. Saturday, and Carrollton at Castleberry, Mesquite at Denison and Denton at Richardson, the latter three postponed indefinitely.

Many other high school games over the state were postponed or cancelled but the number could not be determined.

Dr. Rhea Williams, athletic director of the University Interscholastic League, said his office had had many requests to postpone games and that all had been granted. Dr. Williams said that some of the games would be played Saturday night and most of the others Monday night.

As all over the world, it was a grim scene as the state's football teams reported for practices or prepared for games, those that were not postponed or canceled.

Rice and Texas Tech players and coaches boarded planes to carry them to their respective games at Fort Worth and Fayetteville, Ark. shortly after hearing the numbing news that the President was dead.

From the Houston airport, Rice coach Jess Neely said: "It's a black day for us all. We're all out here at the airport, just fixing to board the plane. We have just heard the news. I guess we've been worrying about the wrong thing. We had better start worrying about things closer to home when this can happen."

Texas Tech coach J. T. King said: "I suppose we'll just go along with our normal game plan. It's a sad thing for the entire world. It certainly puts a damper on the feelings of all of us in playing our last game."

SMU was scheduled to leave by bus Saturday morning for its game with Baylor at Waco. The players at in their training room in grim silence listening to reports of the tragedy on the radio while

trainer Eddie Lane quietly taped ankles prior to a light workout which was held with hardly a word spoken. Later the entire squad held a prayer for the President in the team dormitory. SMU basketball coach Doc Hayes cancelled a scheduled scrimmage.

Texas coach Darrell Royal, who was to have presented the President a football autographed by the nation's No. 1 college team upon his arrival at Austin, said: "Just like the entire nation, we are in a state of shock. Our grief for the President is beyond words. We are all hoping and praying for Gov. Connally."

There were some reports that the autographed football later would be presented to the President's young son, John, who will celebrate his third birthday Monday.

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Market Is Shocked Into Broad Retreat

NEW YORK (AP)—Shocked by the death of President Kennedy, the stock market Friday took its worst loss since "black Monday," May 28, 1962. The New York Stock Exchange and other stock exchanges throughout the country were shut down shortly after news came that the President had been shot.

In a brief half hour—between the first news of the shooting and the order to stop trading—stocks crashed gains made in a vigorous rally and sank swiftly. Big losses were taken by many blue chips. American Telephone fell 10 to 138. Radio Corp. 5 1/2 to 55. General Motors 2 1/4 to 7 1/4 and U.S. Steel 4 1/2 to 45 1/2.

Even before the "big board" ordered trading suspended, dealings were halted in many of the higher-priced and more volatile issues. The Dow Jones Industrial average dropped 21.16 to 711.49, its worst loss since May 28, 1962, when it lost 34.95 in the worst plunge since 1929.

The ticker tape ran 27 minutes behind transactions in the wave of selling that followed news of the assassination. The Dow Industrials were up 3 1/4 at 715.96 at 12:30 p.m. (Dallas time) before the news came. A half hour later they were down 2.47 at 720.18. In the 10 minutes remaining, prices were battered further. Not until 2:56 p.m. (EST), however, did the stock ticker finish printing its final transactions enabling a true picture of the day's action to be seen.

Of 112 issues traded, 93 declined and 11 advanced. New highs for the year totaled 7 and new lows 129. The slide was similarly sharp on the American Stock Exchange where 526 issues declined and 79 advanced of the 799 issues traded. Volume was 1,760,000 shares compared with 1,310,000 in Thursday's full session.

Bonds NEW YORK (AP)—U.S. government bond prices were mostly unchanged Friday while corporates declined in an abbreviated session on the New York Stock Exchange. Although trading was cut short on the exchange at 2:10 p.m. due to the shooting of President Kennedy, volume totaled \$8,270,000. Thursday's total was \$13,710,000, the highest since \$15,660,000 the day the stock market crashed on May 29, 1962.

Cotton Cotton futures were steady in early dealings Friday but prices dropped sharply following news of the President's death. The market was closed at 1:10 p.m. with losses in near deliveries running 65 cents to \$1.20 a bale.

Small demand in near months early in the session reflected the absence of first notice day tenders against the December contract, however there was little feature to the trading until the selling just prior to the close.

Grains CHICAGO (AP)—The grain futures market closed on a mixture of active buying and selling Friday but with all contracts well into the weak range on the Board of Trade. A burst of selling hit all commodities on word that President Kennedy had been shot. Prices broke rather sharply but recovered somewhat when reports circulated through the exchange that the President was rushed to a hospital. The news that he had died did not reach the trading floor until after the market had closed.

Livestock (USDA) — An estimated 1,500 cattle, 3,700 hogs and 350 sheep were received at the eight Southwest terminal stockyard auction in Fort Worth, while practically all hogs were yarded in Kansas. Combined receipts for the week at the eight Southwest terminals totaled 65,300 cattle, 31,300 hogs and 10,225 sheep.

Shooting Plunges Securities; All Markets Close at Death

All security trading stopped in Dallas, as in the rest of the nation, when word was flashed that President Kennedy was dead.

But in the period between the bulletin that the President had been shot and the flash that he had died, stock prices went chattering downward in hectic trading.

Upon the news that the Chief Executive had died, both the New York Stock Exchange and the American Stock Exchange immediately halted trading in securities.

The Securities and Exchange Commission issued the following statement which closed down all other security selling:

"In view of the present emergency and voluntary closing of the principal stock exchanges, the commission requests that all broker-dealers cease over-the-counter trading."

When the market closed, the popular Dow-Jones Industrial Average stood at 711.49, down 21.18 points (or 2.9 per cent) from Thursday's closing level.

Most of that decline was in the last heavy hour of trading. Before the news of the shooting hit the markets, prices during the day had been down then up, then back down but not severely. At

Burkburnett Men Seek State Bank

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — State Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner said Friday that an application has been received for a new bank in Burkburnett.

The bank, to be known as the Burkburnett Bank, would have capital of \$125,000, surplus of \$125,000 and reserves of \$100,000. J. N. Sherrill Jr., Wichita Falls, is projected as chairman of the board and J. R. Cummings, Wichita Falls, as president.

the end of the fourth hour of the day's trading, the Dow-Jones was only off 2.47 points.

William Redding, Dallas manager of the National Association of Security Dealers which gathers over-the-counter stock quotations, said the unlisted market, as it is called, got so erratic in the last hour of trading that he used 11 a.m. quotes in preparing stock lists for newspapers because after that hour prices lost significance.

Dallas brokers said the word of the tragedy flooded their offices with telephone calls from customers wanting to sell securities.

E. O. Cartwright, Dallas vice-president of the big Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith brokerage firm, said all the incoming telephone lines at his offices were soon tied up.

"You couldn't get in to us, the lines were so busy," he said. "Lots of people who wanted to get in to us couldn't."

The flood of sell orders was so heavy that the volume on the New York Stock Exchange amounted to 6,180,000 shares when the market

closed at 1:10 p.m., Dallas time, about an hour and 20 minutes early.

There was much panicky selling. Mr. Cartwright said, commenting: "You would expect a decline in the markets under this very serious event. It was evident that people were really panicky-stricken by it in some cases, and in other cases it was merely an attempt to liquidate some securities in expectation of buying them back on a decline that would likely result."

Mr. Cartwright, like other Dallas brokers, speculated that the securities markets might not re-open on Monday, and possibly for several days, in order to permit emotions to subside.

Speaking of the immediate closing of the markets, Mr. Cartwright said, "I think it's a fine idea, because the circumstances are so drastically unusual and so unhappy that closing the market seems to be the best thing that could be done. They might just as well keep it closed until the general feeling about the situation settles down. That may result from the inauguration of Mr. Johnson."

Myron Hauser of the brokerage firm of Hauser, Murdoch, Miller & Co., with offices in the Praetorian Building on Main Street, said he watched the President's car pass by in the street below, with the President smiling at the crowds, and then walked back to his office and said down only to have a man on his direct wire from New York say, "I hear the President's been shot in Dallas."

"They're always making jokes on the wire about Dallas," Mr. Hauser said. "So I told him, 'Quit making jokes, I just saw him five minutes ago.'"

At that moment, someone in Mr. Hauser's office called out that the flash that the President had been shot in Dallas was on the Dow-Jones news wire.

The four are:

1. \$17,907,880 in 4 1/2 per cent subordinated convertible debentures due Sept. 1, 1976, issued earlier this year in a debenture exchange.

They will be redeemed at 104 1/2 per cent of the principal amount, together with interest accrued to Dec. 27, by the trustee, First National Bank of Fort Worth.

James J. Ling, chairman of the board of LTV, announced the redemption and called it "a most significant step in the retirement of Ling-Temco-Vought's long-term debt."

Added to the recent retirement of \$2,718,800 in other debentures previously acquired by the company, it will eliminate more than 16 per cent of LTV's long-term debt.

It will leave LTV with \$34,677,960 in long-term debt, consisting of \$23,446,600 in 9 1/2 per cent non-convertible debentures issued in the debenture exchange earlier this year, and \$10,230,000 in 9 1/2 per cent subordinated convertible debentures, the balance of that issue of debentures which were not surrendered for exchange earlier this year.

"The call will initially increase short-term bank obligations of LTV," Mr. Ling's announcement said. To provide funds to repay the short-term obligations, provision has been made for the sale-and-lease-back of \$18,000,000 worth of machinery and equipment, and "additional funds will be generated from earnings and the sale of certain investments."

Although the redemption date is Dec. 27, payment of the redemption price and accrued interest to such date, will be made at any time after Nov. 22 upon surrender of the debentures.

The company said arrangements for the earlier redemption were made "to avoid any delay in effecting payment to the holder which might result if so large a volume of debentures were accumulated until Dec. 27 and payment made at that time."

The right to convert the principal of the 4 1/2 per cent convertibles will expire Dec. 17, ten days before the redemption date. The right to convert the 9 1/2 per cent debentures will expire on the redemption date.

Wall Streeters Wonder Who Took Soybean Oil

NEW YORK (AP)—It's Wall Street's biggest mystery of the year: What happened to a large part of 161 million pounds of soybean oil declared missing in the wake of a bankruptcy which put two big brokerage firms in the federal dolehouse.

On Wednesday the old-line houses of Ira Haupt & Co. and J. Williston and Beane Inc. were suspended by the New York and American stock exchanges.

It was disclosed that the day before, Allied Crude Vegetable Oil and Refining Co. of Bayonne, N.J., unable to honor more than \$6 million dollars overnight margin calls from the two firms, filed a petition of voluntary bankruptcy in Federal District Court, Newark, N.J.

Haupt's margin call was for \$18,000,000; Williston and Beane's for \$610,000.

The question of what happened to the soybean oil was taken to New Jersey Superior Court in Jersey City, N.J., where a restraining order was granted to Haupt.

Howard Clark, president of American Express Co., said: "We delivered oil from Bunge to Allied based on a delivery order from Bunge."

Commodities traders have said that Allied's troubles may have stemmed from large accumulations of vegetable oils and futures based on anticipation of sales to Soviet-bloc countries.

Wall Streeters trace the vegetable oils overload to optimism based on anticipation of sales to the Soviet Union, which suffered adverse crop conditions during the growing season.

Bunge Corp., a New York export firm which said it held \$15,300,000 in oil as security from Allied, said Bunge said it had given credit to Allied and received non-convertible warehouse receipts on 161,111,881 pounds of crude degummed soybean oil as a security collateral.

This oil, according to Bunge, was stored in four specific tanks at American Express Warehouseing Ltd., a subsidiary of the American Express Co.

A check early last Monday, Bunge said, showed that the oil was still intact. But another check later in the day, the firm charged, showed that forged release orders had been issued under its name.

A third check of the tanks Wednesday, Bunge said, showed that two of the tanks were empty, one was half full of oil, and the fourth was almost full of a mixture of water and oil. Bunge said this check was made by the Superintendent Corp., an independent surveyor.

Assassin Crouched And Took Deadly Aim

By KENT BIFFLE

The assassin crouched in a dusty corner of the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository Building at 411 Elm.

Through a half-open window he watched the Presidential procession through the cross hairs of a 4-power scope. Even at a hundred yards the shooting was easy. The scope brought the President up close.

As the motorcade passed, the assassin fired. He worked the high-powered rifle's bolt and fired again. He took deliberate aim and fired a third time.

"I saw the President's hair fly up . . . I knew he was hit," sobbed Miss Karen Westrook, 19, a stenographer for a publishing firm with offices in the School Book Depository Building.

With other workers from her office, she'd walked out in front of the building to see the motorcade.

The assassin made his way from the death window on the southeast corner of the half-century-old, rust-brick building to a stack of school book boxes on the northwest corner of the floor.

Here he hid the rifle in stacks of boxed basic readers.

"They've shot him . . . they've shot the President," screamed a middle-aged man holding the hand of a small boy. The man was weeping.

Police Patrolman J. M. Smith, 31, ran to the west side of the building throwing open his holster. Several people had fallen on the grass. Others were ducking behind bridge abutments and bushes.

Police Patrolman W. E. Barnett, 31, made for the back door of the building. "There must have been 2,000 people in a one-block area here," he said.

Conclusion raged. Some people were screaming and crying. Smiles were still frozen on the faces of others who had at first assumed this was a prank.

reports from the killer's muzzle were just firecrackers. A few pointed toward the textbook building. But most ran to the west side of the building thinking the shots came from behind bushes and a fence dividing the street from a railroad yard.

There were many faces in the windows of the building.

A few people outside the building, like H. L. Brennan, a 44-year-old steamfitter, actually got a glimpse of the gunman.

"After the first shot, I looked up and saw him. The gun was sticking out the window. I saw him fire a second time.

"He was a slender guy, a nice-looking guy. He didn't seem to be in no hurry," said Brennan.

"I heard a shot and saw the President sort of slump down in the seat," said Jerry Brosch, 19, of Grand Prairie.

"This is going to be a black mark on Dallas history forever," said somebody. "Dallas? What about the U.S.?" asked another.

Homicide Capt. Will Fritz led police on a floor-by-floor search of the building. The sixth floor is a storeroom, a maze of crated textbooks, cobwebs and steam pipes.

Police found three spent cartridges at the window at the southeast corner. There was a gnawed piece of fried chicken nearby and an empty cold drink bottle.

A little later police found the weapon, its steel bolt plate and muzzle exposed at either end of a stack of textbooks.

R. S. Truly, superintendent of the textbook building, was standing in front of the building. "I just went blank at first . . . I couldn't believe it was happening."

Truly said about 40 people work in the building but most of them were out front at the time the shooting started.

Deputy Police Chief George Lumpkin used scores of firemen and policemen in a systematic search of the building.

An officer entered and told the lawmen that a policeman, J. D. Tippit, had just been killed. No details.

An employee of the textbook firm walked up. "I don't know if you're interested in this . . . but one of the fellows who works here is gone. Can't find him anywhere."

The police were interested. "He's 21, about five-foot-nine and weighs around 150 pounds. I'd have to check the payroll records to be sure but I think he's been here a couple of months."

"His name is Lee Oswald."

President's Murder Charged to Oswald

Lee H. Oswald, an admitted "pro-Castro" man who once lived in and sought Russian citizenship, late Friday night was charged with murdering President Kennedy.

Oswald, 24, earlier had been charged with the pistol-slaying of Dallas policeman J. D. Tippit.

Dist. Atty. Henry Wade accepted the murder charges from Police Chief Jesse Curry and Homicide Detective Capt. Will Fritz at 11:26 p.m.

Justice of the Peace David Johnston, with whom the charges were filed, ordered Oswald held without bond in both cases.

had made no confession to either the assassination of the President of the United States.

He and Wade stated jointly that the charges were filed — particularly in the death of the President — based on physical evidence at hand.

Curry declined to state what Oswald's background, Sec. 1, Page 5.

Wade said he expects the case to go to the Dallas County grand jury at mid-week. "There are some pieces of information that need to be picked up," Wade said.

U.S. Atty. Barefoot Sanders of the Northern District of Texas said late Friday night there is no specific federal statute covering

the assassination of the President of the United States.

"However, there may be other federal criminal statutes involved here and we are studying them," Sanders stated.

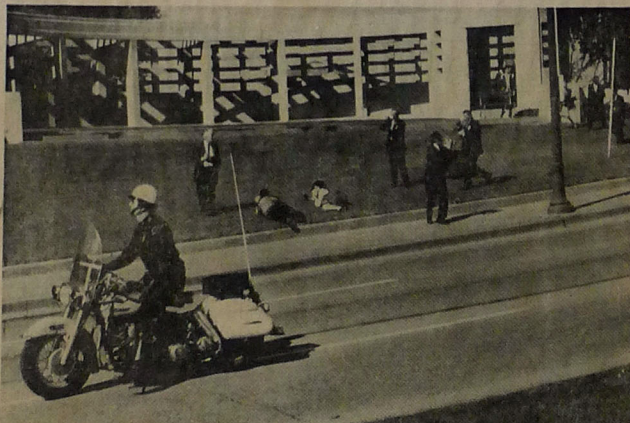
Shortly after midnight Curry and Wade held a formal press conference announcing the filing of charges in the President's murder.

Oswald later was brought in to the crowded police squad room. In response to reporter's questions, the defendant said he had requested counsel.

He said the "judge gave me a hearing that was very short and snappy."

When asked if he killed the President, Oswald replied, "I have not been told that I have been charged."

AFTER PRAYING FOR KENNEDY'S LIFE

Somber Crowd Files Out of Mart

By CARL FREUND

They came to hear the President of the United States. They remained, shocked and disbelieving, to pray that he would live.

Then, their faces somber and their eyes filled with tears, they filed from the Dallas Trade Mart after learning that President John Fitzgerald Kennedy was indeed dead.

The first inkling that anything was wrong came when reporters dashed from the Trade Mart, where more than two thousand Dallas residents had gathered to listen to the President's speech.

"Something must be up," an elderly man said, glancing up from his steak.

"Oh, those reporters are probably just going out to watch the President's arrival," his wife said. Then, slowly at first, the word spread from table to table.

"The President had been shot. There were the inevitable questions: Where? How? Was he badly wounded? Those in the audience pushed aside their steaks. They gathered

in small clusters around owners of portable radios.

Rumors spread through the crowd. President Kennedy was dead. No, he was critically wounded, but still alive. Gov. John Connally had been shot, too.

Erk Jonsson, who had been scheduled to preside, went to the microphone at the head table at 1 p.m.

"There has been a mishap," he said in a calm voice. "We believe it is not serious at this time."

MAYOR CABELL DECLARES DAY OF PRAYER FOR J.F.K.

Mayor Earle Cabell declared Saturday a day of prayer for Dallas, asking that the city's churches remain open from midnight Friday until midnight Saturday to mourn the death of President Kennedy.

His statement: "As mayor of a grief-stricken city, I hereby declare a day of prayer following the tragic and untimely death of our President, John F. Kennedy.

"In order that every person may claim for himself resources which God alone can provide, I further request that every house of worship, regardless of denomination, remain open continuously from midnight tonight (Friday) until midnight Saturday."

Then the Rev. Luther Holcomb asked the group to rise and join him in prayer.

"It is the most earnest prayer we have ever offered in behalf of the President and governor and their families," he said.

As he prayed for the recovery of the President, who had died minutes earlier, the pastor said: "Oh, God, none of us can find words to express the deepest feelings in our hearts."

Others remained at tables, listening to radios.

The Rev. William Dickinson went to the head table at 1:25 p.m. He offered the benediction. Confusion spread through the cavernous Trade Mart. Many could not hear the pastor and they were uncertain what he had said.

Had the benediction merely marked the end of the luncheon? Or had he announced the President was dead.

Then, seconds later, the announcement came over the radio. It was punctuated by a woman's scream.

Jonsson announced the shooting had been more serious than first reported. He urged the crowd to remain calm.

Women dabbed at their eyes. Men shook their heads.

"Those damn fanatics," a man shouted. "Why do we have to have them in Dallas?"

"This is a disgrace to Dallas," a judge said.

Leaving their steaks half eaten, men and women began filing from the Trade Mart. Some wept.

Anonymous Call Forecast Slaying During Transfer

The self-appointed executioner of President Kennedy's accused assassin was the materialization of a blunt warning issued police hours earlier, The Times Herald learned Monday.

An anonymous telephone call to Federal Bureau of Investigation headquarters at 2:15 a.m. warned that Lee Harvey Oswald would be killed during his transfer from the city lockup to county jail.

The FBI immediately relayed the warning to police and the sheriff's office.

Oswald, notwithstanding the warning and dozens of riot-gun armed policemen, was fatally wounded in the basement of the police and courts building at 11:20 a.m. as officers prepared to place

him in an armored car for the short ride to the courthouse.

Jack Ruby, nightclub operator and physical culture addict, darted from a crowd of newsmen with cat-like speed, rummed a .38 revolver into Oswald's body and triggered a shot witnessed by the world.

Police stood helpless. One managed only to swear in the split second that added a second explosive chapter in the President's assassination.

Meanwhile, Ruby was transferred from city to county jail without incident about noon Monday.

The transfer took place so casually that neither newsmen covering the county court and records building nor the crowds outside had an inkling of the action.

The Times Herald learned Monday afternoon that Ruby was with John Hollbrook, a Dallas psychiatrist often used by the district attorney's office to determine the sanity of criminal suspects.

At the mass, Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston, old friend of the Kennedy family, offered up the holy eucharist, and prayed: "Almighty God, may this sacrifice cleanse from sin the soul of your servant, John, who has gone from this world, and so may he receive forgiveness and everlasting rest from you."

Near the flag-enveloped coffin, Mrs. Kennedy knelt before the high altar and received the cardinal's hand the wafer of communion — the wafer which in the Roman Catholic faith had been converted into the flesh of Christ.

Grieving in the cathedral were the new President, Lyndon B. Johnson, and his wife, Lady Bird. They too rode and walked in the procession that took the body from the Capitol, past the White House, to the cathedral, and then to Arlington, across the Potomac River in Virginia.

The Kennedy children, Caroline and John, with whom their father loved to play, were at the great church to say their own goodbye.

When the services ended, Cardinal Cushing stooped and kissed Mrs. Kennedy, her veil flaut-

ing in the cool breeze, took Caroline and John by their hands. They walked down the cathedral steps behind the casket.

As servicemen put the casket back on the caisson for the three-mile journey to Arlington, John put his hand up in salute.

Little John, 3 years old today, seemed a little bewildered. He turned his head to the side, and looked behind him. Caroline, who will be 6 on Wednesday, was composed but pale.

The church bells tolled. The muffled drums beat.

Mrs. Kennedy and the others rode to Arlington in limousines.

AN EDITORIAL

Night of the Soul

THE EVENTS of the past few days are beyond reason. Our city is left in the shocked depths of numb disbelief.

But even as we are staggered by one violent discharge of hate following another, the citizens of Dallas are surely engaging in the greatest spiritual self-examination any American community has undergone in this century.

Dallas churches held massive, prayerful, sober crowds Sunday. They were solemn, deeply convicted; people seeking forgiveness, people seeking some way to find relief of their torn spirits.

This was no routine morning of churchgoing by an already religious city. This was a pilgrimage, an act of civic penance compelled by an indescribable feeling that all of us have contributed something to the atmosphere which has caused or allowed these acts to take place here.

But in church or out, Dallas is a city undergoing the dark night of the soul, a city appealing to a Higher Power.

This search for meaning cuts across all religious boundaries. Its participants are from every church and synagogue; they include all who bear the capability of spiritual shock.

We feel this unique moment is one of such sincerity, such genuine passion, that to question or try to evaluate it is both impious and unnecessary. If you are living in Dallas today, you know that something is happening here that is beyond human understanding.

We are a city trying to find ourselves, and with God's help we will.

Cuba Claims Dark, Sinister Forces Behind Killings

HAVANA (UPI)—Ernesto Guevara, minister of industry, said last night that "dark and sinister forces" were behind the assassinations of President Kennedy and his accused killer, Lee H. Oswald.

"Everything indicates that in the next few months and years world peace will be threatened by the most unscrupulous, ferocious and warlike monopolistic oligarchy—and with the most murderous potential—that the history of humanity has ever known," Guevara told electrical workers at an indoctrination forum.

He said Oswald's slaying yesterday was like something out of a Hollywood gangster movie.

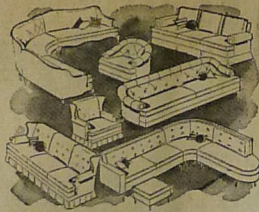
Guevara's remarks followed Premier Fidel Castro's assertion that American right-wing groups were behind Kennedy's assassination.

He denied any Cuban involvement in the killing and suggested that Oswald could be an innocent scapegoat, a mentally unbalanced person or "an instrument of reactionaries, an agent of a manœuvre plan to carry forward a policy of war and aggression, to place the government of the United States at the mercy of the most aggress-

sive circles of monopolies, militarism and the worst elements in the United States."

He cited the recent violent demonstration against Adlai Stevenson, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, in Dallas (reporting the United States were identifying Oswald as a "Communist" and trying to instigate that Cuba and the Soviet Union were responsible for the President's death).

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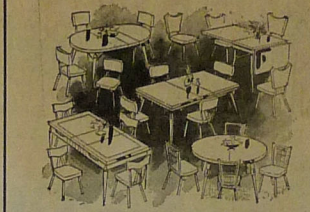

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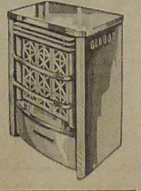

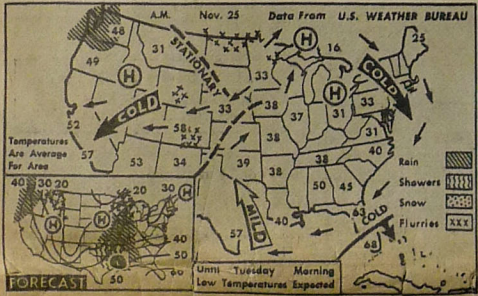

The three television networks are not expected to resume regular programming until Tuesday morning.

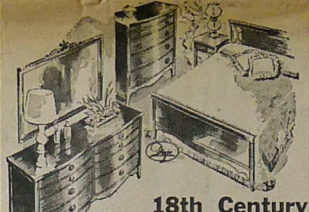

SUNDAY SERVICES

Despite brilliant skies and bracing weather, there was a leaden feeling of almost inappreciable sadness Sunday as thousands of Dallastites went to their churches. They went knowing that their President had been shot by an assassin and that prayers would be said and sorrow expressed, but they went knowing that nothing would bring the President back. While they were at religious services, other Dallastites driven by some impelling force were in downtown Dallas—waiting, many for hours, for the transfer of Lee Harvey Oswald, suspected of killing the President. Oswald was to be moved to the county jail from the city jail.

DECIDED TO LEAVE

My wife and I were at services at St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, when at about 11:20 a.m. something made us decide to leave in the midst of the Com-

munion Service.

To me, the feeling of foreboding and sadness was almost stifling. My wife was even more over-

come by the strange mood. One of the Scriptures had been from Jeremiah, and the part which stuck in my mind was the phrase "we are wearied of murder."

"Do you want to leave," she asked.

"Do you want to leave," she asked. She nodded, and we left, feeling foolish, yet completely overcome with the mood of depression. We did not even take time to sign the special register expressing our sympathy for the bereaved Kennedy.

"It's been this whole thing—this awful feeling since the President died," she said. "I felt like I was about to faint."

We drove away from the church.

IT'S A PRETTY DAY

"It's a pretty day," I said half-heartedly.

We started to go home, yet

neither of us really wanted to get inside the house again where the radio and television only reinforced our feelings of grief.

"Let's drive by the place where all the wreaths are," she said.

"I wonder if all the crowds are still around the court house waiting for Oswald," I said.

We drove downtown, and at Lamar and McKinney I remembered that the traffic was heavy. We hadn't had the radio or television on all day.

Traffic flooded downtown streets as we drove along Record street near Elm, a block from where the President was shot on Friday.

An excited Negro man ran by the car.

"Turn on your radio," he yelled in passing.

We turned the car radio on, and the first words which leaped out were that Lee Harvey Oswald had been shot.

The crowds milled around, traffic coming to a near halt.

Nearly, a few persons wandered about, looking curiously at the many floral wreaths placed near the spot of the President's assassination. The rest of the milling crowd talked excitedly of Oswald's shooting at the City Hall.

Nehru Praises JFK 'Greatness'

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru described President Kennedy as "a very good friend."

Addressing his governing Congress party followers in Parliament Sunday, Nehru spoke with great feeling, struggling to keep his emotions under control.

"Great as Mr. Kennedy was in his lifetime, he has become greater still in history by this martyrdom," Nehru said.
